INDEPENDENT CANDIDATE WAS DEFEATED

(Special to the Post)

London, Oct. 29.—In the bye-election held in East Middlesex yesterday to fill the vacancy caused by the death of Robert Sutherland, M.P.P., the Conservative candidate, George W. Neely, was elected over William Sutherland, Independent, by a majority of 551. The defeated candidate is a brother of the deceased member, who had a majority last December of 25.

The vote cast was slightly less than that of last December, although the interest in the campaign was intense and during the last week there have been three or four meetings a night. Sir James Whitney and three of his Ministers were in the riding in Mr. Neely's behalf, and the Liberal leader, N. W. Rowell, K.C., campaigned for Mr. Sutherland, who had adopted his plank "abolish the bar" in the closing week of the campaign.

The Liberal vote was not cast strongly for Sutherland because of the adverse attitude taken toward him by the temperance candidate. The fact that Mr. Rowell, after this, took him up had the effect of splitting the temperance vote.

The riding is made up of the Townships of London, North Dorchester, West Nissouri and Westminster. The latter three are all "dry" through local option and London Township votes on it this year.

The result of yesterday's vote by townships was as follows:

Mr. Rowell's Statement

Toronto, Oct. 28.—On learning the result of the bye-election in East Middlesex, Mr. N. W. Rowell, the Liberal leader, said: "When we consider the efforts put forth by the Government and the liquor interests to carry the riding, the result, though regrettable, is not surprising. Mr. Sutherland, the Independent candidate, while working faithfully himself, had no organization whatever throughout the riding, and it appeared difficult to awaken any enthusiasm among Liberals on behalf of an Independent Conservative. The result is shown in a large falling off in the Liberal vote in the Liberal stronghold of Westminster Township. Elsewhere also a large number did not go to the polls. On the other hand, by reason of Mr. Sutherland's alleged attitude in the past on the temperance question it was not easy to awaken enthusiasm on his behalf among the friends of temperance."

"I went into the campaign not primarily to win, but to force to the front a great issue, and to compel the Government to take a stand. This I have done. This contest, while important, was only a preliminary skirmish. It has developed the position of the enemy. The fight will proceed to a finish, for the bar must go."

Mills Is Elected

Berlin, Oct. 29.—The large majority of 1,400 was rolled up yesterday for Charles H. Mills, the Conservative candidate in the bye-election to fill the vacancy in the Ontario Legislature.

Mr. Mills, who has made a good record for himself in the city as a public-spirited citizen, is returned comfortably as if by acclamation. The industrial centres, Berlin, Waterloo and Elmira gave him a thousand majority alone. Matthew W. Vayman, Socialist, polled 511, an increase of 57, and ex-Mayor Huber received 169 votes.

The suffrage reform candidate, J. T. Utley, whose name did not appear on the ballot, said last night that he accepts the verdict of the people with entire satisfaction.

Returns are not yet complete, but later figures will not materially affect the majority.

More Safety for Steamers

Berlin, Oct. 29.—New rules for ocean going steamships were approved yesterday at a conference held at the Ministry of the Interior, at which representatives of the German Ministries, the Federal Council and the shipping interests were present. The new rules have been adopted as the basis of Germany's attitude at the international conference to be held in London.

They deal with the question of bulkheads, lifeboats, wireless telegraphy and the reporting of icebergs. All passenger steamers carrying 75 persons, including the crew, and freighters carrying a crew of sixty, must in future be equipped with wireless telegraphy having a radius of 100 sea miles.

These vessels must also carry a certain proportion of skilled oarsmen to man the life boats. The regulations as to bulkheads have been thoroughly amended.

Lister Pleaded Guilty

At the police court this morning an Indian lister, whose name is withheld in the interests of justice, pleaded guilty to the charge of being drunk while on the prohibited list. No penalty was imposed until the police secure the party who furnished him with liquor.

WEAPON FIGURED IN REIL REBELLION

In the front window of Mr. E. Gregory's drug store can be seen for the next ten days a rare old pistol, secured at the battle of Fish Creek in Reil's Rebellion. The gentleman who secured the weapon is Mr. Thomas McQuaw, who now resides in the village of Minden. At that time Mr. McQuaw was a private in the 57th Regiment under the late Colonel James Z. Rogers, of Peterboro. His commander-in-chief during the rebellion was the late Colonel Williams of Port Hope. The old relic referred to is a single barreled breach loading pistol, shoots a forty-four rim fire cartridge and is very heavy in structure. Its mechanism is perfect in every respect. It is much prized by its present owner, F. C. McGahay, of town.

GUELPH CAPTAIN IS PROMOTED

Guelph, Oct. 25.—Word was received by Mayor Thorpe today from Col. Sam Hughes, Minister of Militia, to the effect that he had given instructions to have Captain Walter Clark, of this city, gazetted as lieutenant-colonel. Capt. Clark, for many years was drill instructor at the Ontario Agricultural College and Guelph schools. It was in 1854 that he first entered the British army service as a trumpeter. He served in the Crimea and other wars, coming out to Canada in 1872. In 1880 he settled in Guelph. It was largely due to his efforts that the cadet movement was launched, as it was in this city that the first cadets, a Highland regiment, was organized at the Guelph Collegiate Institute.

'O PROMISE ME' BARRED BY CHURCH

St. Paul, Minn., Oct. 26.—"O Promise Me" and other songs popular at nuptial rites hereafter will be barred at all Roman Catholic weddings in the diocese of which Minneapolis is a part in accordance with a letter just issued to all priests by Archbishop John Ireland. No music save the sacred Latin chants prescribed by the rubrics of the church will be heard. The same ruling applies to funerals. "Grave abuses have crept into some churches, so that at times the listener wonders whether he is taking part in a Catholic or in an altogether secular service," said the Archbishop's letter. "To this state of things a peremptory estoppel is imperatively called for."

CAR LEFT TRACK NEAR EGG HOUSE

A C.P.R. freight train from Toronto, hauled by engine 2613, blocked the C.P.R. line near the egg house for almost two hours at noon today, owing to a car leaving the track. The trucks left the rails at the diamond and tore up the ties.

BOGUS OATH HAS REACHED LINDSAY

The bogus Knights of Columbus oath which has been freely circulated in Western Ontario, has now reached this section of the province. A number of copies are in circulation in Lindsay. The oath has been run off on a typewriter, and is a revised form of the so called Jesuits' oath, which went the rounds some few years ago. The individual who drafted the fake epistle is evidently a firm believer in the statement made by the late P. T. Barnum, that the people like to be fooled. The Toronto Globe exposed the bogus oath a few days ago.
