## OBITUARY

### PETER PERDUE

The death took place on Oct. 8th, of a well known and highly respected resident of Fenelon township in the person of Mr. Peter T. Perdue, in his 59th year, after an intermittent illness of about three years. The deceased gentleman was a resident of this district over forty years and enjoyed the respect and esteem of the community. He was a kind neighbor, and possessed many excellent qualities. In his death his family is bereft of a loving husband and kind father. Mr. Perdue at one time was a member of the Fenelon council. He represented the Sylvester Mfg. Co. for years and also assisted Mr. Foster Kelly of Fenelon Falls, but had to retire on account of ill health. Later he again improved in health, and was appointed lockmaster at the Roosedale locks, which position he held at the time of his death. The deceased leaves to mourn his loss his sorrowing wife, three sons and one daughter. The sons are William H., of California, John A., of Grimsby, Ont., and George M., on the homestead with his mother. The daughter is Mrs. Wm. Perdue of Cobocook. The sympathy of the community goes out to his bereaved wife and family.

### CHAS. F. CROWE

The body of Charles F. Crowe, who died at Cascade, British Columbia, on October 3rd, arrived in Bobcaygeon on Thursday, October 10th accompanied by his bereaved young wife and two children. Owing to the bad roads the body was not taken to the home of his parents, but to that of his uncle, Mr. Silas H. Crowe, and was borne on the afternoon following from there to the Noye's Creek cemetery, and buried beside his sister, Mrs. Robert Cairnduff, who died four years ago. A large number of friends attended the funeral, and his brother Foresters gave the burial service assisted by his pastor, Rev. W. G. Smith, of Bobcaygeon.

The deceased was the son of Nathaniel and Margaret Crowe, "The Cedars," Noye's Creek. In 1909 he married Ruby, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. William Beatty and went to Revelstoke, British Columbia, where the young people were doing well but owing to the burning of the large mills there they removed to Cascade, on Kettle River, where he had obtained a situation at the large mill of that place. He had heart trouble, and on going to the mill on the morning of the day he died he complained to some of the men that he was not feeling well. They wished him to return to his home and they would manage all which was to be done, but he said he would be all right in a little while. When they missed him at noon and looked for him they found him lying on his back in about four feet of water. When taken up there was no water in his lungs. To all appearances the heart

had failed and he had fallen back off a log which was in the water near him. When Mr. Davis, foreman of the mill, and intimate friend of deceased, found him, he could stand on the log at the body lying at the bottom. He seemed to have dropped out of life in a moment and without a struggle. Besides his sorrowing young wife and two children he leaves his father and mother, four sons and three sisters to mourn deeply the loss of a dear husband, son and brother.

## C.P.R. TRAIN RAN INTO OPEN SWITCH

The Canadian Pacific Railway train, No. 634, running from Detroit to Toronto, was wrecked in the terminal yards at 4.50 o'clock yesterday as the result of running into an open switch. The passenger engine rammed a light locomotive standing on the siding and completely demolished one of the new, large stock cars, and injured a number of passengers. But for the fact that the train was travelling at a low rate of speed it was stated by an official that the loss of life would have been large.

According to the list of injured compiled by the C.P.R. but nine were hurt badly enough to necessitate medical attention. It was stated, however, that a larger number were slightly bruised or shaken up, but they left before the officials could ascertain their names.

The C.P.R. train due in Lindsay at 7.50 p.m. did not arrive last night until after 9 o'clock.
