According to Farm and Dairy the potato rot is general from one of Ontario to the other. Potacoes were scarce enough last year, but if the rot is as serious as reports that Farm and Dairy has received from numerous correspondents ail over the country would seem to indicate, potatoes will be almost, if not altogether as scarce as this year. The crop in the first place was well up to the average; in some sections T. C. Robinette, K. C., when seen bumper crop. But with 20 to 70 per cent. affected with rot and still rotting, even when dug, many districts will have a very small surplus available for market. In fact, many in a position to know, predict that farmers will themselves have to buy po-Frank J. Cheney makes oath that tatoes even as they did last year.

This is the condition of affairs that might be expected when we take into consideration the rainy season that we have experienced. Rainy weather most favorable to the development of potato blight, which is the cause of all rot. On sandy land rot is not so prevalent as on heavier soil, but even here the crop has not altogether escaped. The biggest difference is between early and late varieties, the early being harvested in fairly good condition; some agriculturists report that these early varieties have started to rot in the cellar.
