HYDRO PURCHASED EUGENIA FALLS

The following despatch will be of local interest, as several Lindsay gentlemen are interested in the water power.

Owen Sound, Ont., Nov. 20 —The Georgian Bay Power Company, which a few years ago started the Eugenia Falls a power proposition, has disposed of their property and their small house at the falls to the Hydro-Electric Commission. Mr. Thomas McLaughlin, secretary of the company, was in Flesherton last week, and confirmed the report of the sale. It is said that the commission is going to develop the Eugenia water falls for the towns in this part of the province.

Eugenia Falls is on the Beaver River, and is situated about 35 miles from Owen Sound.

Engineers report that 3,000 horsepower can be developed.

SERIOUS ACCIDENT AT HALIBURTON

Echo: As a result of an accident on Friday morning, (15th inst.), Mr. Sam Walling lies between life and death at his home here, the doctor giving no hope of recovery. Though no one saw the mishap and Mr. Walling has not since been able to give a very full account of it, it appears that while driving out of the village, the horse took fright at some object on or near the crossing, and while attempting to hold him Mr. Walling was thrown out on a small wooden bridge near there, sustaining severe bruises and internal injuries, as well as a blow on the back of the head, probably from the horse's foot. He has not since the accident been fully conscious for more than a few minutes at a time.

WEEK'S DOINGS AT FENELON FALLS

In St. Andrew's church on Friday, 22nd inst., Miss Ratte, of Toronto, representing the social and moral reform work, addressed two meetings. In the afternoon Miss Ratte spoke on rescue work to women-only, and gave a most impressive address, illustrating forcibly the necessity of preventive work by mothers and others, as well as rescue of those who have fallen. A high tribute was paid by the speaker to the Salvation Army, who led the way in this field, which was now being entered by the different denominations. Miss Ratte has been engaged in the work for twenty months during which time she has visited jails, hospitals, slums, etc., in the effort to uplift the fallen.

In the evening she addressed a mixed meeting, and during the evening heavily scored the cheap theatre, the moving picture show, and immoral post cards and literature as being the occasion of the downfall of hundreds of boys and girls. The moving picture show was especially condemned, as even the pictures that had passed the board of censors might not do the adult mind any harm, but would perhaps lead a youth or child to ruin. What we want said the speaker, is a board of common sense.

On Monday afternoon a number of the members of St. Andrew's choir met at the home of Mr. Stuart Mason and presented him with an address and a handsome umbrella with Masonic emblem, on the eve of his departure for Weston. The presentation was made by Miss S. Martin on behalf of the choir of St. Andrew's church. Mrs. G. A. McArthur read the following address:
