GRANT ASKED FOR WINTER FAIR

Thursday morning. The council met this morning at 10.45, and despatched business preparatory to the committee meeting held in the afternoon. The report of the Emily Agricultural Society was referred to the financial committee. A deputation of Mr. John Carew and Mr. Geo. A. Jordan on behalf of the Lindsay Winter Fair, approached the council upon the motion of Reeves Robertson and Tolmie, and addressed the members. Mr. John Carew said the council knew the benefits of the winter fair,

and he would not go into details. Only \$100 was asked from the county, although \$300 is required. \$50 will be asked from the town and the balance made up from subscriptions from the merchants. It is a worthy cause, and you will doubtless consider it as such. Mr. Geo. A. Jordan said he had not asked for enough last year, and the same amount was desired this year. Instead of the baby show, an excellent moving picture programme will be given showing prominent events of the day. Mr. Jordan put the case in a strong manner, and materially aided the appeal of Mr. Carew. Warden Steele promised the consideration of the council in the matter. The usual allowance to the Warden was introduced by Messrs. Simms and Tolmie, and the matter referred to the Finance Committee. A motion of Reeves Mulligan and Fee provides for an allowance to the chairman of county property, if passed by committee. The grant to the Winter Fair was formally applied for by the motion of Reeves Simms and Morrison and depends now upon the action of the

finance committee. The printing committee report was read by Chairman Graham, and was satisfactory. Reeve Bottom assisted by Reeve Mulligan brought in a motion to have a meeting of the different assessors of the county at Lindsay, to discuss and receive instructions, so that the work might be more uniform. The council meets at 10.30 Friday, while this afternoon County Property and Educational Committee meetings will be held.

News Letter: The death of Orillia's oldest citizen occurred on Sunday evening at the hospital, when Mr. John Young passed away in his 100th year. He was born in North Gwillimbury in 1813, making his age just two months short of the century. Through a letter received some days ago from Mr. E. D. Orde, Vancouver, we get the news of the death of an old resident of the town of Lindsay, Mr. Lachlan McLean, who at the time prior to July, 1879, conducted a gent's furnishing store east of the Benson house. At that time he closed up his business here and went to Winnipeg, where he joined his brother Malcolm in the wholesale grocery and liquor commission business, which they carried on for a number of years. Finally Malcolm sold out to Lachlan and a young fellow by the name of McNabb, but a change in the times following the boom of '82 proved unlucky for them. McNabb went to South America and a year or two after Lachlan went across the border, where he has lived ever since, and during a couple of years ago in Southern California, of pneumonia. He was at one time president of local St. Andrew's Society.

Its wheel base of 146 inches, is 11 inches longer than that of any other car in the city, and the car is propelled by a water cooled motor of 45 horse power. The Quaker Oats Company has at present eleven of the automobiles touring different parts of America. The car that visited this town came to Canada early this summer, and before that it had been travelling in the Southern States, particularly in Texas.

The car was a conspicuous one, and in this connection is suitable for advertising purposes. The gun, shooting puffed rice into the glass tower of the car, created a considerable amount of interest here. It was operated by the engine. The car left here for Oshawa, Guelph and Galt. If the weather permits it will make a tour of the western provinces, after which it will return to Texas.
