## CONSTRUCTION AND MAINTENANCE OF BRIDGES BIG ITEM FOR THE COUNTY

Wednesday Nov. 20. The committee on Roads and Bridges met at 2 o'clock, with Reeve Michael in the chair.

The report of County Engineer Belcher concerning the Pigeon Creek floating bridge was read, and his estimate of \$76,168 read. The structure would be practically in the same place as the old, but would be a swing design.

Reeve Bottom said that when the committees had met in Peterboro the proper method of approaching the government was discussed. The member of parliament at Peterboro (Burnham) and Col. Hughes were willing to do all in their power.

Dep. Reeve Dobson moved that Dr. Vrooman and Dr. Mason be asked for their co-operation.

Warden Steele pointed out that the Peterboro committee was looking after that and it would be wasting time for the Victoria council to intervene.

Reeve Morrison agreed with this method. Chairman Michael mentioned that Reeve Morrison inferred that the government would only assist in building the swing, but he (Michael) believed they should and would pay more. The committee from Victoria was composed of the Warden, and Messrs. Fee, Devitt, Michael and Bottom.

Mr. Robertson told of the condition of Cross Creeks bridge. The water was fifteen inches above the bridge at times, and caused school to be closed. The bridge is low and the approaches, which are far too low, might be raised a foot or so with gravel. Some repairs had been made, which were fairly satisfactory, but the piles were rotten, and it was pretty shaky for traction engines.

Warden Steele said he and Mr. Robertson had examined the structure, and found that all except a

couple of stringers were sound. The trouble at present was that it was falling sideways. Posts placed in the winter against the side would prevent any further damage.

Reference was made to the Cobocok bridge costing about \$2000 since practically completed, and the \$1100 the county had to pay toward the murder trial, the county being put to this heavy unexpected expense.

Re a grant for repairs to Cowan's bridge, Mr. Fee spoke concerning it. The government has not taken the bridge over, nor has the county, so it fell to the township of Emily to make some necessary repairs.

Planking, drawing, etc., cost about \$70, and the amount would neither make or break the county. The bridge in the first place cost about \$4000, and was just paid for last year.

Mr. Dobson--If a small grant were given, would the county be liable in the future?

Probably not, only a precedent would be made.

It seemed hardly worth while for this small amount to run the risk of involving the county. Every indication pointed towards the government taking the bridge over.

By the motion of Warden Steele and Reeve Southern no action will be taken.

In regard to Nicholls bridge across Burnt River, Reeve Morrison was asked to explain what he desired. The bridge cost about \$1100 some years ago, and had to be repaired last year. It had not been properly built and many of the piles had

swerved. This year they had it rebuilt for \$750, widening it four feet and making it exceptionally strong. The river is 200 feet wide and 30 feet deep at this point, where the Union Creek joins the Burnt river. The municipality desires some assistance, and already a small grant has been accepted

from the government.

Mr. Mulligan believed this was a good chance to bring up about his 300 foot bridge at Omeme, and would move that Reeve Morrison should get a grant, on the supposition that he would be equally as well treated.

Mr. Tolmie said he had three such bridges, and wouldn't mind a little help. The whole matter was deferred to January.

The report of the Mud Lake Narrows bridge was read, which desired that an 85 foot span of steel be built instead of 3 of 20 feet each.

Mr. Devitt believed that the committee should not have changed their plans without consulting the council.

Mr. Michael said a compromise had to be reached, and the result he had reported.

Warden Steele moved that the matter be left over until next year, and was seconded by Mr. Varcoe. -- Carried.

Mr. Dobson said Ontario county had no right to have the whole say, when Victoria paid 75 per cent.

Mr. Morrison had been told that the timber was of oak and elm, and still sound.

Mr. Graham deemed this an optimistic view, and said it was sotten.
