The concern is to be the Canadian branch of the Everitt Motor Co., of Detroit, and will occupy 10 acres in the city factory district. The new factory is being handled by B. F. Everitt, and will cost in the neighborhood of \$1,000,000, including the equipment. The company will be known as the Tudhope Automobile Manufacturing Co. 


