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

Dakwood's Magnificent Methodist Church Was Formally Opened in Thursday

Thursday was a red letter day in the history of the village of Oakwood. On that date the beautiful new Methodist church (the handsomes. outside of the largest centres) was open d to the service of Almighty God. The ceremonies in connection with the great function marked an epoch in the history of Meth odism in the district and was looked forward to with pleasurable anticipation, not only by the congregaton, but the people of the surrounding country as well.

For some time it has been realized that the old church in which many of the pioneers of the district had worshipped, was altogether too small for the rapidly increasing adherents of the Method st faith. Preliminary steps were at once taken for the erection of a new and modern edifice, and with commendable enterprise work was started on the demolition of the old church, and the construction work on the handsome new edifice commenced in May.

With a commendable spirit all the members of the congregation vied with each other in contributing time and money to the construction of tne church. The progress of the work was watched with interest by one and all from the time the first "sod was turned" to use an old phrase, until the magnificent pile was ready or the dedication to the service of Almighty God. Dr. Williamson of Niagara had read the scriptures, and another hymn had been announced by Rev. Wesley Elliott, Rev. Dr. Williamson preached a very inspiring sermon on the words "Go Forward." He spoke of the Israelites leaving Egypt to go to the Promised Land. At the Red Sea they were unable to proceed. God then spoke to Moses. "Go forward," and as they approached the sea the waters subsided and they went through to the other shore, where they sang a song of triumph.

THE OLD CHUKCH



Over the circular enclosure containing pulpit and choir loft is the inscription "Enter His gate with Thanksgiving and into His courts with praise."

A large gallery capable of seating several hundred extends over the entrance the full width of the church. Pews of the same design and finish as those in the auditorium have been placed in the gallery. The many windows throw a flood of vari-colored light into the interior, adding an additional touch of grandeur to the sur roundings.
