 There is military drill in the drill shed on Thursday, Friday and Saturday nights for the young men of the town.

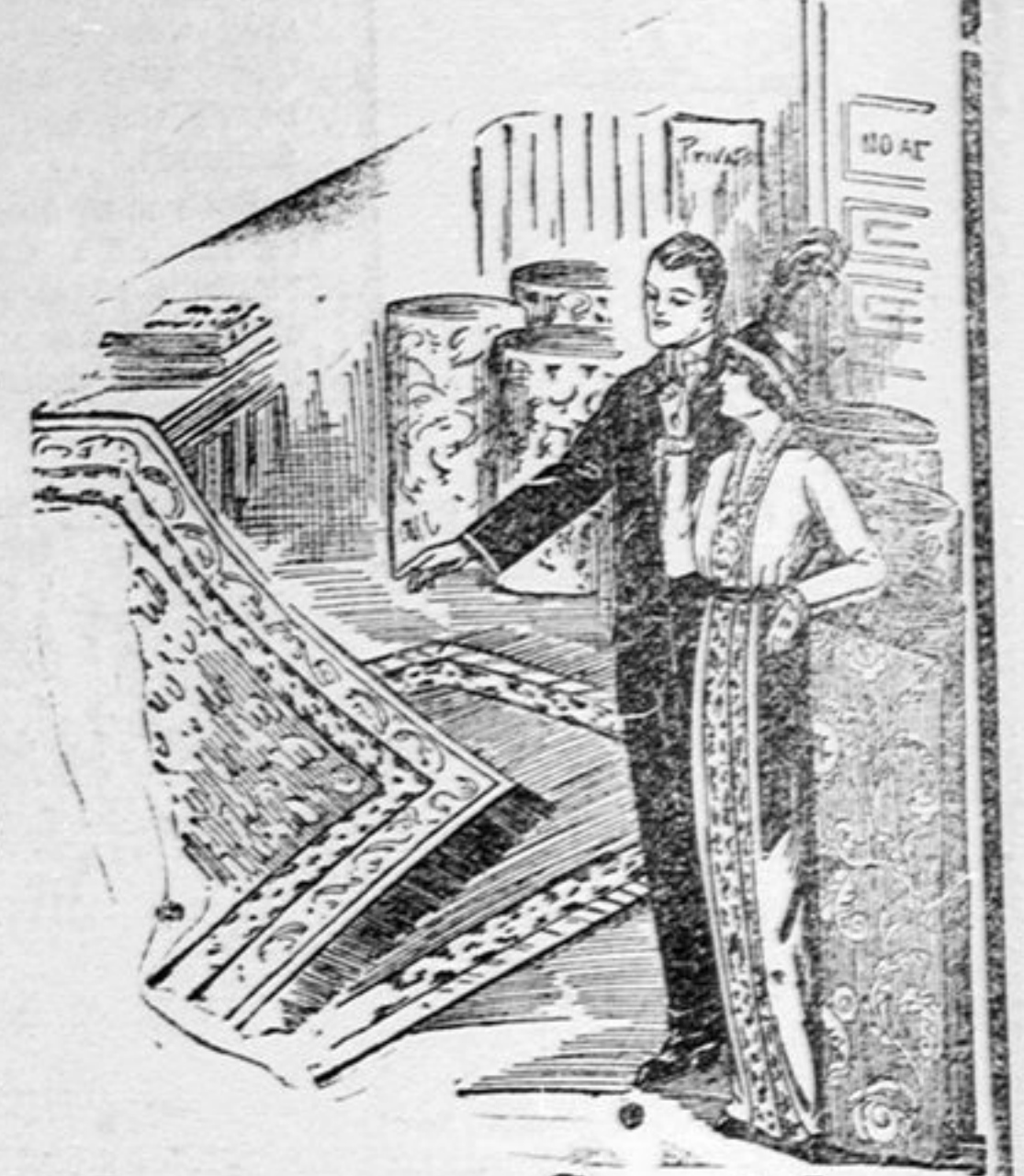
VALENTIA
