The annual meeting of the Horticultural Society was held last night in the Agricultural Office with President Robt. Chambers in the chair. There was a fair attendance and a great deal of interest was manifested in the proceedings.

**DIRECTOR'S REPORT.**  
President Chambers submitted the following interesting report which was unanimously adopted:—  
Gentlemen:—At the close of another year, we, your Directors, wish to hand in this our report.

In the first place, we wish to thank the members of The Lindsay Horticultural Society for the kindness they have shown us in placing us in the position of directors in this society, and for the very valuable assistance we have received from the members. We would also like to thank especially Mr. E. Gregory, who has not only given of his valuable time gratis, but has also worked with us all through the past year and assisted us very materially in keeping the interest of the society before the people of our town.

We commenced the year with a membership of some seventy four members—an increase of eight over last year. We had cash on hand at the beginning of the year \$64.08, and we have now a balance, after paying all accounts due, of \$70.29. We have spent this year on the purchase of periodicals and premiums for members the sum of \$89.38; Secty Tres. salary \$25.00; Printing and postage \$10.30; Miscellaneous expenses \$9.40; making a total expenditure for the year of \$132.09.

Our receipts have been from membership fees \$74.69; Government grant \$63.00; which together with the balance left from last year of \$64.08 is \$202.38.

During the year your officers have held several meetings, in which we have had some very good discussions on ways and means for the furtherance of the interests of your Society, and although perhaps, we did not do just as much as we might have done, still we feel that our time has been by no means wasted and we surrender our trust knowing that your society is in a better shape both in membership and finances than when we assumed office.

We are sorry to have to report that during the past year our society has suffered very heavily through the death of two of our best members in the persons of our late Secretary Treasurer, Mr. F. Framp-ton, and Past President, W. M. Robson, both of whom were particularly active in furthering the interests of our Society. It would seem that their places will be hard to fill, but whilst we regret their departure from amongst us, we feel thankful for their example, which ought to stir up in us a desire to emulate them, and urge us onward to greater efforts in the future.

In the matter of preparing for the coming year, your Directors have arranged what we thought to be a very good premium list for fall distribution, leaving to the incoming directors to supplement it with a Spring Collection, which we would recommend they take up at as early a time as they can conveniently do so. There are also some other matters which we would suggest for their consideration, among them being the assisting of the Lindsay Improvement Committee in their efforts to improve and beautify our town and help to make Lindsay what it should be, one of the best business towns and the prettiest towns in Ontario.

**PETERBORO MAN SAFE BLOWER**

Saskatoon, Sask., Nov. 6—J. C. Scarth, Brooklin, Ont., and James Kelly, of Peterboro, alleged to be two of the gang of five safe blowers who have been operating throughout western Canada, were arrested here this afternoon. They arrived in this city from Regina at 3.10 and were placed under arrest at 3.30 by Chief Detective Springer of the local detective department. Scarth, when arrested, was about to lift a plant containing among other things, enough nitro-glycerine to more than blow up every safe in Saskatoon. He was fully armed, having two 38 calibre and one 32 calibre revolvers. In addition he carried five pounds of dynamite, partly cooked, 50 feet of fuse, 100 rounds of ammunition, caps, tape, candle, and flashlight.  
The police allege he practically admits having operated in Winnipeg, Regina, Moose Jaw, Calgary and Edmonton. The police also claim he admits being implicated in the blowing of safes in Regina in the latter part of August. On August 22 he was arrested on suspicion of being a member of the gang that perpetrated numerous robberies in Saskatoon and also with the blowing up of the safe of the Modern Steam Laundry here.  
From the lack of evidence he was let go. Immediately after he left the city a safe in Regina was blown and \$700 taken. Three other members of the gang well known to the police are still at large. The men arrested will come up tomorrow on a charge of vagrancy.
