much more rapidly than can be done in the east, and with a much smaller amount of cash capital.

The land is so much more productive out here and is so easily brought under cultivation that a young man with barely enough cash to buy his outfit of horses and to carry him over the first summer for household necessities, can very soon make good. Failures, of course occur out here, the same as in all lands but there are few where the necessary thrift is exercised.

Mortlach, which is situated in the municipality of Wheatlands, and on the main line of the C.P.R., is a town of about 600 population, is growing rapidly, making good and permanent progress. Both the Bank of Toronto and the Bank of Hamilton have erected fine new commodious offices here this season, and are both doing an extensive business, each of them keeping six employees constantly.

We have four fine elevators here all running to their full capacity. There has been over a half million bushels of wheat shipped out from here already this season, large quantities are now held in store, and a great proportion of the wheat is still in farmers' hands. There are large quantities of flax and oats grown in this district. I look on this section of country as being ideal for mixed farming, as the land is very productive, and grows a fine sample of grain, and the unbroken prairie grows such luxuriant grasses, but the crowning feature of this district is the abundance of good water and its freedom from alkali. This characteristic gives us a predominance over many parts of the west.

There is one of the finest openings in this town for a flour mill to be found anywhere, the nearest mill of this kind being in Moosejaw, 27 miles distant. All of the flour used in these parts has to be freighted in here and sells at \$3.25 per 100 lbs, and at times as high as \$3.50.

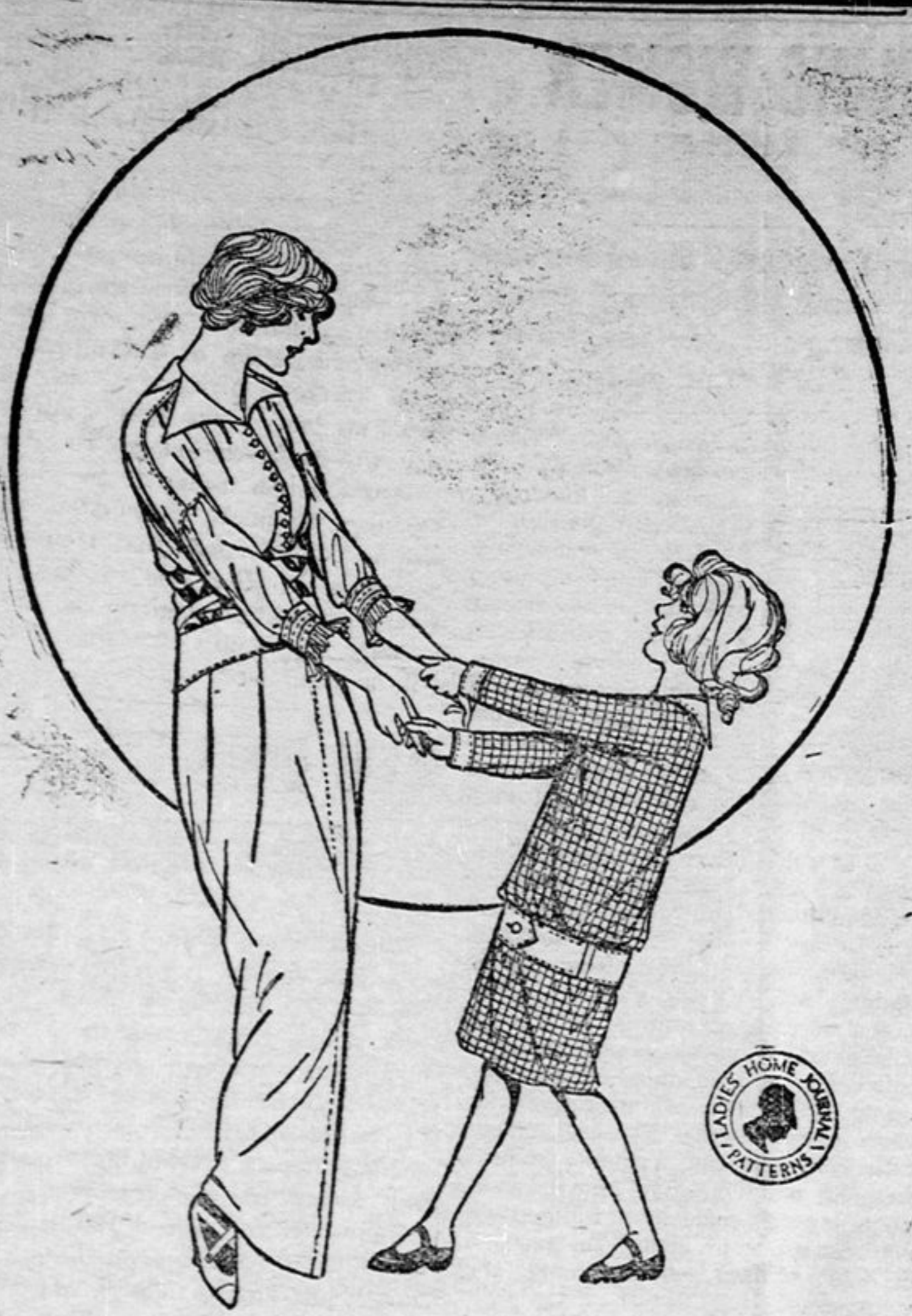
There is an excellent opening here for a machine shop, a medical doctor, a veterinary surgeon, and a lawyer could each find splendid openings in this town.

We have the best of shipping facilities for freight, and a fine passenger train service. The number of trains which pass through here daily is marvelous.

In respect to crop and weather conditions existing throughout this district, I may tell you that we have had an ideal season all through this year. Spring came in, the seed went into the ground last spring in fine shape, and in good time, and the weather all through the season was good. We had frequent rains, the harvest was ideal weather all through. Threshing is now all done, and the yield of grain has been highly satisfactory. Fall ploughing continued up to November 15th, and the weather at the present time is exceptionally fine.

Monetary conditions have been pretty tight all through the west this year, but the great fertility of the soil, the wonderful natural resources of the country, the optimism of the people, coupled with the heavy emigration from all lands, and last, but not least, our fine climate, have a determining influence in restoring confidence, and the horizon is already brightening, and the silver lining is now in sight, and the west is bound to go forging ahead.

WEATHER BULLETINS TO REACH FARMS

Electricity for the farm is to be followed by meteorology for the farm on a system which, it is believed, may result in almost as great advantage to the agriculturist as the adaptation to farm life of the benefits of "white coal". The Globe understands that the proposed system of Canadian agricultural meteorology has been carefully and fully worked out, that it has been approved by both Hon. J. D. Hazen, Minister of Marine, and Hon. Martin Burrell, Minister of Agriculture, and will be formally announced in the near future.

The system has been thought out, prepared and perfected by Mr. R. F. Stupart, Director of the Dominion Meteorological Service. It was this project which largely engaged his energies on his recent mission to Europe, and The Globe learns that he conferred with many of the old world's best meteorologists in the working out of all the details.

In an agricultural country like Canada it is believed that it will be of inestimable value to have a branch of the meteorological service devoted solely to the assistance of the agriculturist on lines which have not heretofore been attempted upon this continent, and the officials are confident that it will work out well.

When interviewed concerning the project, Mr. Stupart said he was not in a position to make public the prospective system nor any of its details until the official Government order reached him. He anticipates, however, that an announcement will be made before the end of the present year.

Canadian Club For Lindsay

A meeting of citizens will be held in the council chamber tomorrow, (Tuesday) evening at 8 o'clock for the purpose of organizing a Canadian Club. Clubs of this nature have been formed in many Canadian cities and towns, and it is desirable that Lindsay should fall in line. The object of these clubs will be explained.

SMOKE CONSUMERS ON GRAND TRUNK

The Grand Trunk railway has been experimenting for some time with smoke consumers for application to locomotives, and has so far met with sufficient success to warrant equipping all the yard locomotives at Windsor, Ont., as well as a few others at different points on the system. The type used is very similar to those in use by railways in Chicago, where an anti-smoke campaign has compelled them to use some device that will materially reduce the smoke. Along the side of the firebox, from 16 to 18 ins. above the fire, there are eight tube openings. On the outside are small steam jets, so placed that the jet at the point of entering the tube creates a strong draught and carries a volume of air over the top of the fire. The air brought in through these side openings mixes thoroughly with the smoke in the firebox immediately after it is given off from the bed of coals, and with a bright fire burning the smoke is almost completely consumed. In a demonstration several shovels of coal were thrown on a bright fire, resulting in dense smoke being given off. Turning on the steam through these side jets reduced the smoke almost instantaneously, so that the vapour given off at the stack was just slightly coloured. The results of the experiments have been so successful that it is not all unlikely the yard locomotives all over the system will be so equipped. The road locomotives may likewise be so equipped, but the advantages accruing are not considered to be as great, as in yard locomotives, where the question of smoke in the atmosphere is of considerable importance to the community.
