A meeting of a number of prominent citizens was held in the reading room of the library on Saturday afternoon, the object being to consider the question of sending flour to the Belgians.

A committee was appointed, of which Rev. W. H. A. French was elected President, C. G. Graham, M.D., Vice-pres., F. W. Warren, treasurer, and H. B. Johnstone, M.D., secretary.

It was decided to issue several hundred circulars and mail them to the farmers and others in the surrounding country.

The circulars state the fact that six hundred thousand Belgians are facing absolute starvation in Brussels, 25,000 destitute being added to the population of the city every day.

Six ounces of flour doled out with a little soap to each individual each day. This six ounces now reduced to three ounces per person per day.

These are the sad conditions in Belgium. The Miller's Association has offered to transport flour to Belgium free, with the personal guarantee of the U. S. government for safe delivery to Belgium.

This committee appeals expectantly and confidently to everybody in the community, and to the farmers of the neighborhood to give either contributions in money for the purchase of flour, or any kind of produce to be exchanged for flour, as money forwarded is of no use.

Anything you contribute will be thankfully received by Mr. F. W. Warren, treasurer. The minimum amount of flour to be shipped is 25 barrels. Mr. J. H. Brandon has kindly given five barrels and has offered to grind flour free of charge, or exchange flour for any marketable commodity.

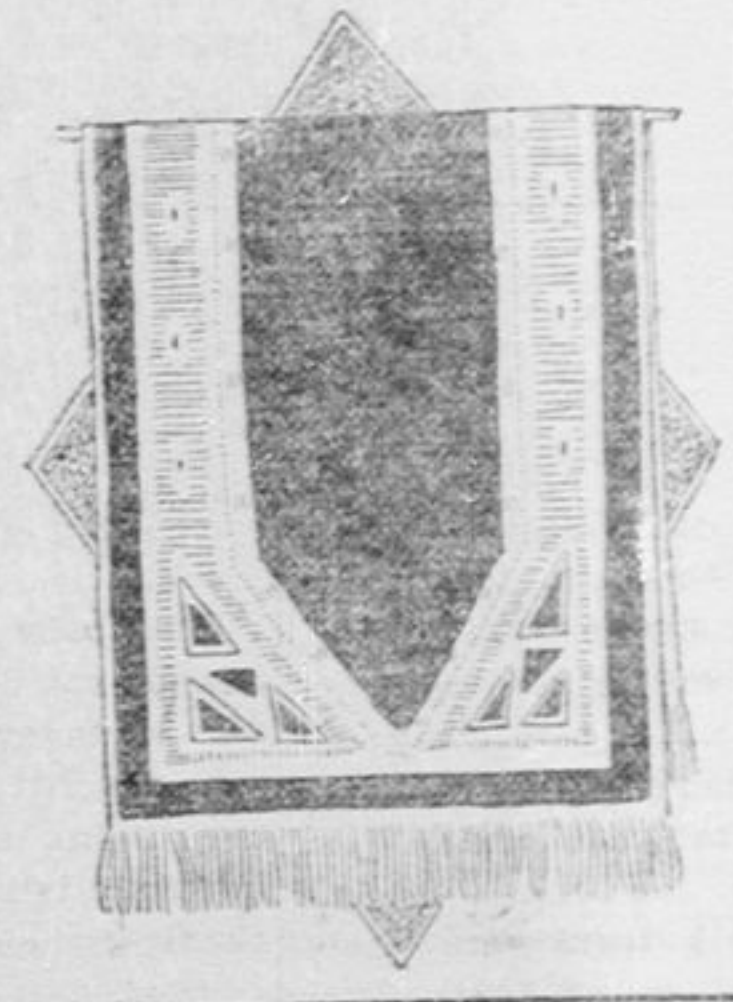
