MAJORITY CUT IN WEST HAMILTON

(Special to The Post.)
 Toronto, Nov. 21.—The cut in the Government majority in West Hamilton from 1488 to 39 is occasioning much comment here. In a constituency which was considered overwhelmingly Conservative, the fact that the Government candidate barely escaped defeat in the first Provincial bye-election since the general election, is taken as clearly indicating that the strength of the Conservative Government in the Province was due to Sir James Whitney personally, and now that he is gone the Government is particularly weak and vulnerable. It is also taken as indicating that labor is becoming an increasingly important and powerful factor in the political life of the Province.

Significance is also attached to the statement made by Mr. Rollo, the Labor candidate, in his address after the election returns were in, that he had been opposed by the liquor interests, which supported the Government candidate. The view appears to be that the liquor interests are as strongly back of the new premier as they were of the Government in the general election, and that they will fight Labor just as they fought the Liberal party in their efforts to maintain the Government.

Mr. Studholme, the Independent Labor member for East Hamilton, has steadily increased his hold upon the constituency, and now West Hamilton has almost swung into line for the Labor forces. The Liberals in East Hamilton did not oppose Mr. Studholme, the Labor candidate in the general election but on the contrary supported him and they treated Mr. Rollo in the same way. It is felt by many Liberals as well as Labor men that Liberalism and Labor should co-operate in the support of progressive policies, just as they are doing in Great Britain.

H. A. PEARSON GETS CAPTAINCY IS NOW WITH THE ALLIED TROOPS

Mr. John Pearson, of Haliburton, has received word from his son, Lieut. H. A. Pearson, of the Second Contingent, and who is now on French soil. Lieut. Pearson, who is a former officer of the 19th Regiment, St. Catharines, has received the rank of captain. He is identified with the Y.M.C.A. work in the Second Contingent, and from the letter received, it is learned that he is now on the firing line. Capt. Pearson was a former member of the Post staff. His brother Frank (also a former member of the Post staff) is with the Second Contingent.

Failing to comply with the above Government Act you are liable to a fine of \$10.00 to \$30.00 for each offence.

GERMANS AFRAID TO START RETREAT

(Special to The Post.)
 LONDON, Nov. 24.—A despatch from Copenhagen says that it has been learned in German military circles that, despite the serious situation on the eastern frontier, the Germans have not diminished their strength in the western theatre. The Germans will not give up their position in northern France and West Flanders, unless it becomes vitally necessary, for such action would cause the spirits of the German people to fall so low that revolution might follow.

The Germans are expected to increase rather than diminish their efforts to get Calais in consequence of the Kaiser's special command. On account of the strategical and political importance of Calais, the Germans will disregard the cost in human life that its capture entails.

DIPHTHERIA SPREADS AROUND PETERBORO

The diphtheria epidemic is not alone confined to the city. It has spread to Otonabee township, with the result that two schools are closed. The disease produces the same effect as that which characterizes its appearance in Peterborough. In the majority of cases the attack is very slight, but sufficient to justify the enforcement of quarantine regulations.

Last week Sanitary Inspector Spence inspected a number of dairy farms throughout the township. In nearly all cases, general conditions were found to be satisfactory and in conformation with the regulations enacted by the Board of Health. In one or two instances, suggestions were made respecting changes that will eventually result in a better quality of milk.—Examiner.
