Table with columns: Cons. 12, 13, 14 & 15, Value of Benefit, Value of Outlet Liability, Value of Injuring Liability, To cover interest for Ten Years at 5 per cent., Total Special Rate, Annual Assessment During Each Year for Ten years.

FOR paying the sum of Five Hundred Dollars, the amount assessed against the said roads and lands of the Municipality and for covering interest thereon for ten years at the rate of five per centum per annum a special rate on the dollar sufficient to produce the required yearly amount thereof shall over and above all other rates be levied and collected in the same manner and at the same time as other taxes are levied and collected upon and from the whole rateable property in the said Township of Mariposa in each year for ten years after the final passing of this By-law during which the said Debentures have to run.

THIS By-law shall be published once in every week for four consecutive weeks in "The Lindsay Post" newspaper published in the Town of Lindsay and shall come into force upon and after the final passing thereof and may be cited as the "Municipal Drain Number 2A By-law."

TAKE NOTICE that the Court of Revision of the Township of Mariposa for the Revision of the Assessments of lands and roads in the Township of Mariposa for the above drainage work will sit at the Township Hall at Oakwood in the Township of Mariposa, in the County of Victoria, on Saturday, the Twelfth day of December, A. D., 1914, at the hour of one o'clock in the afternoon to hear, try and determine all complaints in regard to assessments of the lands above mentioned wrongfully assessed or omitted from assessment or assessed at too high or too low an amount and all other complaints in regard to the aforesaid assessments, which may lawfully come before the said Court of which all parties concerned are required to take notice and to be present at the sittings of the said Court at the time and place aforesaid.

AND TAKE NOTICE that all Notices of Appeal to the said Court shall be served on the Clerk of the Municipality of the Township of Mariposa at least ten days prior to the first sitting of the said Court. DATED this tenth day of October, A. D., 1914.
