Mr. Davidson gave him some change and in the evening took compassion on him and brought him to his home.

On Tuesday Mr. Davidson looked his house and went away on business. When he returned at 12 o'clock he was surprised to find the residence broken into, and the thought dawned upon him that a robbery had been committed. On searching the pockets of his clothes he found that the sum of \$2,500 had been extracted therefrom. Suspicion strongly pointed towards the young man upon whom Mr. Davidson had recently disposed kindness and solicitude, but he could not be found in the locality.
