# Polled Angus Cattle Were the Favorites

At the Fat Stock Shows This Year ---Won Grand Championship at Guelph

At Guelph fat stock show a steer sired by an angus bull received the highest honors, winning first in his class and the grand championship, the most coveted honor of the year in Canada.

It was a "black" year, says the Breeder's Gazett'e, of Chicago, angus cattle cast a gloom over rival breeds from the show ring to the stock yards, and thence on to the coolers where hung the show carcasses. At the great Chicago International fat stock show, angus cattle won the grand championship, single bullock, grand champion steer herd, grand champion car lot and grand champion carcass. Truly, the angus cattle have made a wonderful showing in such strong competition with all other breeds.

At Lindsay this last fall the angus were more in evidence than in former years, and the quality of the animals was better. This is a breed that thefarmers and stockmen of Victoria county ought to become better acquainted with, as they are ideal grassers and extra good doers during the long cold winter months. A strong point of this breed is the fact that over ninety per cent of the calves sired by any angus bull are black and hornless, besides the angus sires seem to have the ability to impart their superior beef qualities to the calves.


