

Association to Protect Property

Useful Hints for the Formation and Government of a Vigilance Association

A few weeks ago The Post in referring to the many thefts being committed among the farmers of this district of borses, cattle, poultry, grain, etc., emphasized the necessity of a vigilance association being formed for the purpose of apprehending and prosecuting felons who commit these depredations.

When a farmer suffers the loss some of his property, he, as a rule notifies the chief of police, and furnishes that official with all the information available concerning the theft. As the chief has not a reserve fund at his disposal for the expenses incurred in connection with the forwarding of telegraphic messages and the mailing of printed descriptions of the articles stolen, the farmer obliged to make a deposit to cover

By organizing a vigilance association among the farmers, this formality is done away with, and as soon as a theft is committed the machinery of the association is set in motion, with the result that in a grea majority of cases the offenders are run to earth.

Branches of these associations hav been organized in different parts the province, and have proved most successful.

The organization consists of a president, vice president, secretary-treasurer, and a committee of nine other members. The officers and committee shall be a board of management, having full control ol the affairs of the Any person may become a member

by paying the sum of one dollar at entrance, and the like sum if required at the termination of each year after the formation of this associaas annual subscription, and such other sums as may be necessary for the exigencies of the association. The association does not take cognizance of any felonious ac that may be committed on the property of persons not members at th time such felony was committed. A member who fails to pay his assessment shall not receive any benefit from the society, and any person intentionally misrepresenting the ownership of property stolen shall be ex-

Any member divulging matters that should necessarily be kept secret expelled from the committee, and no information is given of the proceedings of any meeting to an absent member. Such information must be obtained from the secretary.

When property is stolen from any and throat cleared up." member of the association a reward of \$25 is offered on such sums as the committee deems necessary, to any person giving information leading to the detection and conviction of the thief and the recovery of the prop-

cuffs and other necessaries required for the minute men to defend themselves with when in search of stolen property are furnished by the association, which does not pay any unnecessary expenses for liquors, etc., to persons employed as minute men. The parties sent out in search felons or stolen property do

receive more than \$1.50 per day for horse and \$1.00 per day for man, exclusive of travelling expenses.

Members who lose property and are satisfied that it has been stolen, notify any officer or member of committee as early as possible, when minute men are immediately appointed.

There is no reason why such association could not be formed in Victoria county or in different parts of the county for that matter, as it has proved a phenomenal success in different parts of the province, and has almost entirely wiped out petty thieving in the districts where the society is in operation. An or- tawa. ganization of this nature is in existence in Ontario county with a membership of over one hundred.

Accidental Death of Roland Ayotte

Young's Point Jury Hears Evidence and Decides as Above

Young's Point, Dec. 9. - "That the said Roland Ayotte came to his death accidental shooting," was verdict reached by the coroner's jury yesterday in the inquest into death of little Rollie Ayotte, who was killed in Harvey township on November 12th, Considerable evidence was heard during the day but there was nothing of a sensational nature brought out, the evidence pointing strongly to the fact that young Aybute had been shot accidentally, although just how, it was hard to ascertain from the testimony. There James Young, a prisoner in King- was nothing to indicate that there was any foul play in connection with the boy's death, and it only took the jury a few minutes to bring in their verdict after they had retired to consider the evidence.

The inquest which had been adjourned from December 1, was resumed at ten o'clock in the annex of the Lakeview house, with Dr. Gray presiding Mr. R. E. Wood represented the Crown, while Mr. O, A.
