**Sons of England Recognize Worth**  
Mr. Jas. Boxall Presented in Toronto with a Past Supreme President's Jewel  
At the 33rd anniversary of the founding of the Sons of England Benefit Society held in Toronto on the 14th inst, under the auspices of Albion Lodge No. 1, Mr. James Boxall, of Lindsay, past supreme president, was made the recipient of a valuable jewel.  
At the head table were seated beside the president, the supreme president Bro. T. A. Smith, and the past supreme president, Bro. James Boxall. These leaders of the order both made eloquent and inspiring addresses in response to the toast of the supreme president.  
It fell to the duty of the supreme president also to present to Bro. Jas. Boxall, now past supreme president, an exceedingly handsome past supreme president's jewel as a mark of the esteem in which he is held by the members of the society for the services he has rendered. Preceding the presentation Bro. T. A. Smith delivered a stirring patriotic address. He aroused the enthusiasm of all present when he recounted the facts connected with the rally of Englishmen from all the colonies of the Empire to the defence of imperial interests in South Africa. With dramatic force, clear enunciation and stirring phrases he depicted the sterling characteristics of Englishmen and carried his hearers to the highest pitch by his eulogies of the race which has done so much for civilization. He concluded his remarks by making the presentation and pinning the jewel upon the breast of the past supreme president.  
In reply to the toast of the supreme lodge, Bro. Boxall reviewed the history of the society. He pointed out the growth that has been attained in thirty-three years and illustrated in a most striking manner by giving the expenditure for sick and funeral benefits and by beneficiary payments during the past year. He told of many moving incidents of brotherly consideration shown by members of the order to those who were in need, and attributed his affection for it and for the brethren for their brotherly kindness to him during a long period of illness many years ago. For twenty-five years he has been a steady worker in the interests of the Sons of England, and this was largely the outgrowth of gratitude inspired in his address by the kindness of other days. Bro. Boxall made a serious appeal to the assembled company to study the history of the order and to practice its principles with increasing devotion, and concluded a most eloquent and inspiring address amid the applause of all present.
