OPS COUNCIL

The final meeting of Ops council for 1908 was held on Tuesday, December 15th with all members present.

The minutes of last meeting were read by the Clerk and on motion of Messrs. O'Loughlin and Hawkins were adopted.

COMMUNICATIONS

From J. R. McNeillie, county clerk a statement of expenditure on approaches to swing bridge, of which Ops, share was \$237.81.

A letter from Mr. McNeillie, secretary treasurer of the Ross Memorial Hospital board calling attention of council to the necessity of a street light at or near the boundary west of the hospital, and suggesting that Ops bear part of the cost — the Ops ratepayers adjoining being benefited thereby.

The members then produced their personal accounts for the year, which were examined and passed. They consist of session allowance and mileage, commission on money expended, and special days' service. The amounts were as follows: Road division No. 1, John O'Loughlin, \$82; road division No. 2, Reeve, Hopkins, \$58.70; road division No. 3, Wm. H. Wilson, \$67.13; road division No. 4, Samuel Coulter, \$84.65; road division No. 5, Peter Hawkins, \$66.24.

These amounts, together with the swing bridge, account of \$237.81, and a few small accounts, were paid on motion of Messrs. Hawkins and Coulter, so as to appear in the treasurer's financial statement.

Mr. Daniel O'Connell addressed the council at some length on the advisability of having an electric light at the west end of Kent-st. and that he understood the board of governors of the hospital would place one there if Ops would contribute a share of the expense. He hoped they would do so, as it would be appreciated by Ops ratepayers west of the town.

The council were of opinion that the county, rather than the township of Ops, should bear the expense, since the county as a whole is benefited by the hospital, and a motion was passed accordingly.

John Lynch applied for wire fence bonus, but the council advised him to make application to the new council at their first meeting.

The following resolutions were then passed:

Moved by Coun. Coulter, seconded by Coun. Hawkins, that special grants be made for work done as follows: John O'Loughlin, \$25. Reeve Hopkins, \$28.00; W. A. Wilson, \$25.

Moved by Coun. Hawkins, seconded by Coun. Coulter — That \$1.50 be paid to Thos. H. Reeds for roadway through his crop to gravel pit.

Moved by Coun. O'Loughlin, seconded by Coun. Hawkins, that \$10 be paid to John Wilson for 12 days labor ditching on 10th con. road, lot 26.

Moved by Coun. Coulter, seconded by Coun. Hawkins, that Walter Arkey, owner lot 21, con. 3, be permitted to fell and remove trees from the road bordering on his land.

Moved by Coun. Hawkins, seconded by Coun. O'Loughlin, that this council pay \$3, being half the doctor fee for attending Geo. Wylie, hurt on Manvers boundary, provided Manvers council pays the other half.

Closing Chorus—"Tis Christmas Night."

Moved by Coun. O'Loughlin, seconded by Coun. Wilson, that Messrs. Stewart & O'Connor be paid \$20 reimbursement of fee paid to His Honor Judge Harding, for which Ops was liable.

Moved by Coun. Wilson, seconded by Coun. Coulter, that Mr. Smith, township engineer, be paid \$24.00 for extra work on Jewell drain and \$17 for extra work on Halme drain and that said sums be charged to said drain accounts.

Mr. Marshall, collector, presented his bill, but as there was a small balance outstanding, the council, on motion of Messrs. Hawkins and O'Loughlin, extended the time for a few days to enable Mr. Marshall to finish his work and return the complete roll to the treasurer.

Mr. P. Kennedy, treasurer, handed in his financial statement for the year, which was, on motion of Messrs. O'Loughlin and Hawkins, accepted, and of which 100 copies are to be printed.

The bylaw authorizing nomination and election of council for 1909 received the usual readings and was passed, signed and sealed. The following are the booths, deputy returning officers and poll clerks, viz: Div. 1, Booth, Hussey's house, D. R. O. H. Fitzpatrick, poll clerk; Wm. Lett's house, D. R. O., Denis Murphy, poll clerk; Thos. Twoby; division 3, Booth, township hall, D. R. O., H. Carscadden, poll clerk, A. Cunningham, Jr.; division 4, booth, Hartlett's house, D. R. O., Albert Parrett's house, D. R. O., Murphy; division 5, booth, Board Hall, Beabore, D. R. O., Jas. Greer, poll clerk, Thos. Downey; division 6, booth, N. Ops, ch. 15, D. R. O. Jas. A. Agnew, poll clerk, John Gittenan.

Moved by John O'Loughlin, seconded by Peter Hawkins, that this council memorialize the government to order that the height of the new dam to be built at Lindsay should not exceed the height as given by Geo. Smith, township engineer.—Carried.

The township business for 1908 being now closed, the members on motion of Messrs. Wilson and Hawkins passed a vote of thanks to the reeve, for his courtesy as head of the council on all occasions during the year. The reeve in turn thanked the mem-

bers for their expressiveness of appreciation and good will and hoped that all future councils would work harmoniously as they had done. He claimed no special credit, as every member endeavored to do his duty. The council then dissolved and withdrew.

MARIPOSA COUNCIL

Mariposa council proceedings, Wednesday, Dec. 13th. The members were all present and the minutes of the last meeting were read and approved. Mr. J. J. Glass desired a refund of \$7.92 for Mr. J. W. Henderson, being the amount of a double assessment on his building.

Dr. Dale presented an account of \$5.95 for damages sustained by his carriage and harness, caused by an upset on the roadside at Little Britain. After some discussion of the matter the claim was withdrawn.

Mr. Rich reports that Mr. Harcus has completed his contracts on the Dunn drain, and is entitled to be paid the balance of his account, \$15.00.

Mr. Black wished the council to look into the matter of drainage at lot 8, con. 13. Mr. John Glenn presented an account of \$38 for repairing the road at lot 19, con. 5, for work done by his son William, who was unable to attend the council meeting. The account was not paid as it was shown that the work was done principally to benefit the drainage of Mr. Glenn's farm, and he had received no authority from either the council or commissioner to do the work.

Mr. William Fowler reports some repairs on the Hancock drain. Mr. W. N. Philip reported that he had the posts set and the wire bought for 120 rods of wire fence at the south half of lot 9, con. 10, but delay in shipping the wire and the fence was not completed.

Quite a strong petition from the ratepayers of Little Britain was handed the council asking that Mr. John Martin be appointed deputy returning officer for division No. 3, at Little Britain. Mr. Michael presented a report of the expenditures of the boundary line of Brock and Mariposa for 1908, which showed a balance of \$8.80 in favor of Brock. The clerk read a communication from Mr. H. C. Small, secretary of the Ontario Railway and Municipal Board, drawing the attention of the council to sections 10 to 13, of the Ontario Municipal Securities Act of 1908, respecting the submission of by-laws for approval or validation.

Mr. John Sloan desired an extension of time for the collection of taxes as some \$500 remained uncollected. The commissioner's report respecting the expenditures on the boundary of Brock and Mariposa was received and adopted, and the sum of \$8.80 ordered to be paid the treasurer of Brock. Mr. Stacey's report showing the cost of the bridge at lot 11, con. 6, with a steel superstructure to be \$512.94, and the bridge on the side road at lots 10 and 11 with a concrete arch to be the sum of \$289.92 was received and
