Jottings From Fenelon Falls

The East Victoria Farmers and Women's Institute meetings were held at Fenelon Falls on Monday, Nov. 28th. The afternoon meetings held in Dickson's Hall and the Orange Hall, respectively, were well attended. At the Farmer's Institute meeting a good address was given by Mr. Anson Groh, of Preston, on the subject, "Lucerne and other clovers," from the feeders' standpoint. Mr. D. A. MacKenzie, B.S.A., of Lindsay then addressed the meeting on The Care of Poultry Products.

The Women's Institute meeting, was held in the Orange Hall. The chief feature, was an address by Dr. Margaret McAlpine, of Toronto, on "How to be Well and Happy." There was much of interest in this talk, on this vital subject, and the evil effects on the body and mind of fear, worry, anxiety, etc., were forcibly portrayed. These lower the vital forces of the body, and leave it an easy prey to disease germs. Fear especially seems to play havoc with the resisting forces, and the victim seems to invite the very disease of which he or she stands most in dread. The breathing of foul air either by day or night, and often unsuspected, is a cause of ill health. Over-eating and indulgence in indigestible articles of food are both the cause of much trouble. The habit of doping for what are called the minor ailments was strongly condemned. Many other causes were cited as the cause of ill-health amongst women, namely high heels and narrow soled shoes, and the wearing of corsets by girls under 21. To put a corset on a girl of 14 or 15 years is just as barbarous from a hygiene standpoint as foot binding among the Chinese.

To be happy women must first have good health, and second they must fill the mind with something that will prevent looking forward and backward, worrying about the future and grieving over what is past. Introspection is a vicious habit and a narrow point of view a bar to true happiness, which is not dependent on environment as much as is generally supposed. The value of the woman's institute in broadening the minds of women who meet together and exchange ideas is by many not appreciated. Men go out every day and meet their fellow men on the street, in the store and offices and exchange views, talk business, politics, or about the weather, and discuss affairs of world wide influence while women are prone to go to the other extreme unless something is provided to bring them together. At the conclusion of Dr. McAlpine's address, Mrs. Dr. Gould, the President, spoke for a few minutes, heartily endorsing the speaker's opinions and making a strong plea for a larger membership for the Institute.
