Brief Paragraphs From Bobcaygeon

(Special to The Post)

A meeting of the Farmer's Institute was held in the Town Hall on last Tuesday, 30th inst., and was well attended. Mr. D. A. McKenzie, B.S.A., of Lindsay, spoke on underdraining. After he had shown the benefits to be derived from underdraining, he warned those present to observe the following points when putting in a drain. First, if possible, there should be a good outlet. Second, be sure to use good large tile; Third, get as much fall as possible, and have the bottom of the drain perfectly level. The foregoing were the points he emphasized. He said if a drain were properly dug and it led there was no danger of frost harming it. There was a discussion, and a number of the farmers present took part. Mr. Groh, of Hespeler, Ont., spoke on the feed problem of cattle. He used a chart, to show the percentage of nutriment in the different kinds of fodder used on the farm. By this he showed that corn ensilage and alfalfa fed in proper proportions, made a good ration for cattle. Messrs. Jos. Taylor, Jas. Seymour, Thos. Robertson and D. Curtis took part in the discussion that followed.

Dr. Margaret McAlpine gave an address in the evening on the subject, "How to be Well." This was a very interesting address, and many would do well to adopt the advice given, viz., not to worry or fret or wear a sad countenance. A program of songs, recitations and readings was interspersed, and enlivened the evening's session.
