## COPPER JOHNNY

Ottawa Can Boast of the Oldest News boy in Canada

Ottawa may lay just claim to having the oldest newsboy in Canada, and perhaps on the Continent. His name is John McDowell, but everywhere he goes in Ottawa he is familiarly known as "Copper Johnny," than whom there is no more interesting street charac-

"Copper Johnny" has a faculty of bursting into the limelight. Just the other day he was brought up in court on a charge of assault. John's eyesight is failing, but he thought he detected a man who had borrowed some money from him in the distant past. With his cane aloft in a threatening manner, John accosted the man and broke loose with a terrific tirade if the money were not forthcoming at

When Johnny appeared in court he admitted to the magistrate he had made a mistake, and he was most profuse in his apology. A fine of \$10 was imposed, at which Johnny nearly col-lapsed, because John has an extremely high estimation of such a sum as a "ten case" note, but he suddenly revived when the magistrate announced that he would suspend payment.

Johnny was born in Kingston 63 years ago. At eleven years of age he came to Ottawa and has sold papers on the street almost continuously since that time, being easily over a half century in harness.

If there is one thing that has made Johnny famous as a newsboy it is his voice. He has a stentorian call that sounds like a cross between a fog horn and a cow bell of the bass variety. He is heard shouting his wares

for blocks along the street. Having lattled with the world since early life and emerged triumphant over the many vicissitudes that come to a newsboy, John has a soft spot in his heart for the little paper merchants who are his rivals in business, but friends nevertheless. It not infrequently occurs that on a stormy night John runs across some wer kiddle who has been unfortunate in disposing of his papers and has "got stuck" on some of them.

"Well, sonny, how many have you left?" asks Johnny, who counts out enough pennies to reimburse the lad and thus send him on his way with a smiling countenance that soon dries his tears.


