OPERATIONS ON NEW C. P. R. LINE

(Special to The Post)

Montreal, Nov. 5.—It now begins to look as though the C.P.R. would shortly begin work on its proposed new line from Montreal to Toronto, via the lake shore route. The route of the new line, which has been under consideration for many years has been filed with the railway commissioners and it only waits for their approval before work is started. C.P.R. officials stated yesterday that the route that has been surveyed in a very advantageous one compared to the grade on the present line; the new route is particularly good as the grade is only a 4-10 one. It is also a trifle shorter than the present route. The projected line leaves the present C.P.R. line at Glen Bay, just west of Perth, about fifteen miles from Smith's Falls. This part of the main line of the C.P.R. has just been recently double-tracked which would give the new line double track from there to Montreal, a distance of 144 miles, leaving Glen Bay by the proposed line travels south westerly to

Belleville, there it strikes almost due west for a few miles, and then follows the shore of Lake Ontario to Toronto. It is about 200 miles from Glen Bay to Toronto by the route surveyed and it is expected that if the new line is constructed it will enable the C.P.R. to considerably reduce the time for its Toronto to Montreal service.
