How Thousands of Ontario French Children "Get in Wrong" From the Start

There are three hundred schools in Ontario in which bilingual text books are used. These text books are poor affairs, and in the hands of incompetent and unqualified teachers they are just that much worse.

You may have heard Sir James Whitney or have read about him saying that "there is no such thing as bilingual schools in Ontario."

Here is a lesson, page 8, Premier Livre De Lecture — First Reader — French on one side, English on the other, used in the 300 bilingual schools in this Province:

Le chat voit une souris. The cat sees a mouse. Cours, souris, cours! Run, mouse, run!

Si tu ne cours pas le chat va te prendre. If you do not run, the cat will catch you. Voici la souris; This is the mouse; Le chat ne l'a pas pris. The cat did not catch it.

Do you believe what Sir James Whitney says, or do you believe your eyes? The quotations are from the French-English First Reader. These unlucky French children are in wrong from the start. They are not getting a fair chance to obtain a decent elementary education.

WHITNEY GOVERNMENT AND TEMPERANCE TO THE PUBLIC

The Globe.—The open bar in Ontario is no longer defended as a public necessity or convenience. No responsible politician declares for its perpetuation. It is generally regarded as a nuisance and a menace to the community, to be got rid of as speedily as possible.

Assuredly they are not. What are the facts? When the Whitney Government took office in 1905 the local option law, as passed and put in force by the Mowat Government, provided that the bars could be closed in any municipality in Ontario by a majority vote of the electors. In 1906 the Whitney Government, which had obtained valuable aid in the general election from the liquor interests, paid the price for it by an amendment to the law, providing that no bars should be closed except on a majority of three-fifths of the persons voting. In other words, 59 electors could not close a bar if 41 wanted to keep it open. It was also provided to give an air of justice and equality to this retrograde legislation—that bars once closed under the amended law, could not be opened except on a three-fifths vote.

The working out of the law during the past five years proves what a fraud it has been and how effectively it has hindered the progress of reform. During the five years under the three-fifths clause 492 bars have been closed while 421 remain open, that would have been closed had a majority vote governed. Only two bars remain closed under the three-fifths clause that would have been re-opened under majority rule. The net result of the Whitney policy of ham-stringing the temperance vote is that there are 419 open bars in Ontario to day that have been voted out by a majority of the people of the various municipalities, but that remain open under shelter of the "temperance" legislation of Sir Jas. Whitney and his colleagues.

The Liberal platform states plainly that the "Whitney bar" must go and that the British principle of majority rule must be restored. VOTE FOR C. E. WEEKS AND PROGRESSIVE TEMPERANCE LEGISLATION.

SENIOR MATRIC. NEW STANDARD

A movement is on foot by which the standard of entrance to the University of Toronto will be raised considerably. If the scheme goes through all the elementary work now done in the first year at the university will be carried on in the secondary schools.

The question of cost is also a serious one in contemplating a university training, and were the proposals of the president adopted a saving would be effected in hundreds of cases, by having the student remain at home until equipped for the higher standard.

One of the first objects of the movement is to influence students entering a course of practical science, medicine or other faculty now distinct from the arts courses, to take two full years of general education, such as one year in the High school of the home town and one year in arts at the university. This would likely be made compulsory. There is no intention of suddenly raising the standard to that of such institutions as Harvard Medical school, which admits no one without an arts degree.

The Faculty of Medicine has been concerned for some time in urging that the standard of entrance be raised. At present a student can enter with junior matriculation standing. What is desired is to make senior matriculation the basis of entrance.

KING AND QUEEN IN INDIA ENTHUSIASTIC GREETING FROM NATIVE

Bombay, Dec. 4.—"King-Emperor" George, and "Queen-Empress" Mary, as they are officially styled since their arrival in their great eastern empire, landed from the steamer Medina on Saturday, at the Quay at the Apollo Bunder at four o'clock.

The scene was a remarkably brilliant one. The handsome levee dress of the officials and the uniforms of the naval and military officers, together with the bright toilettes of the women, only served to emphasize the gorgeous hues of the ceremonial attire of the Indian chieftains.

Addresses of welcome were presented to the King-Emperor and the Queen-Empress, by the municipality and other bodies, to which His Majesty replied. A royal procession was subsequently formed. It was a mile in length and comprised representatives of all branches of the European and native armies in India. It subsequently traversed all parts of the gaily decorated city.

The native quarters presented a quaint appearance, forests of masts along the streets bearing a multitude of native religious symbols, representative of the various sects. Enormous crowds everywhere heartily acclaimed Their Majesties, who returned to the Medina at 5.30 in the evening.
