BRIDGE COLLAPSED NEAR WINNIPEG

(Special to The Post.) Winnipeg, Dec. 4.—With a crash and a grinding of timber that could be heard for a mile, the big wooden trestle bridge of the C.N.R., spanning the Assiniboine River at the juncture with the Red River, collapsed yesterday morning at 4.20, carrying into the river several cars of a freight train which was being back-

ed across at the time. The structure is the regular pas-senger and freight traffic bridge of the C.N.R. to replace which a steel bridge has been under construction at that point for some time. The cause of the accident is thought to be the derailment of a freight car as it passed on to the bridge.

The Duluth express passed over the bridge at 5.50 Monday night, the last loaded passenger train to cross before the accident. The wrecked bridge was erected six years ago and declared to be perfectly safe. Traffic will not be delayed by the accident. That no lives were lost is regarded as a miracle. The Terminals Co. board is investigating.

The cause of the accident, so far as can be determined, for no one actually saw it, was that a freight car left the rails and struck the southband of the bridge. Part of the train was carried into the river. The yard crew had charge of the train.

Sofia, Dec. 4-The armistice signed by the plenipoteritiaries representing Turkey, Bulgaria, Servia and Montenegro last evening took the revised form drafted by Dr S Daneff, speaker It is reported that Mr. Philip Mark of the Bulgarian parliament. It requires that the belligerent armies shall remain in their present positions, that the besieged Turkish fortress shall not be re-victualled, that the re-victualling of the Bulgarian army shall be carried out by way of the Black Sea and Adrianople after ten days, and that the peace negotiations shall begin in London on Dec. 13. The Greek plenipotentiaries, it is officially announced, did not definitely reject the armistile terms, but reserved decision for 24 hours.

Toronto Vigilance Officer Sees Indency in Normal School.

THE POSTCARD CENSORSHIP

Purity Crusader at Meeting of Association Declares That He Examined Thousands of Cards and Found Many of Them Vulgar-Statuary Not Fit To Be Seen by Young Boys and Girls.

Toronto, Dec. 4 .- R. B. St. Clair summarized the moral reform history of the past week at a meeting of the Toronto Vigilance Association last night.

"This last week," he said, "I visit ed the normal school and I must say that I saw sculpture and pictures which, in my opinion, are far worse than pictures which were declared in court to be indecent.

"On the second floor I saw various so-called works of art, the details of which I cannot describe to a promiscuous audience. "On this floor were boys ranging

from 17 to 19 and girls of the same tender age. The authorities claim that these pictures are needed for instruction in drawing and art work, but I claim that if they are needed, then the girls should be separated from the boys."

Mr. St. Clair also advocated a censorship of picture postcards. Last
