LEE'S PHOTO STUDIO IS A CREDIT TO TOWN

The photo studio of F. D. Lee in the new Beall building is one of the most compact and perfectly fitted studios in the Midland district.

ing of the head. Within the back is concealed a child's seat, by means of which the smallest patient can be handled with the same degree of comfort as a grown up person. In lowering the chair there is a cushion which prevents any jar to the patient.

This new type of electric engine is a vast improvement over the old styles, and accomplishes its work quickly and with a smoothness and evenness that will obviate most of the usual pain. The speed regulation is also such that sufficient power to do work properly is obtained at all speeds and a nice slow speed for use on children's teeth is also available. The cabinet combines the highest type of mahogany furniture with the most sanitary antiseptic utilities.

The switchboard is one of the most handsome and elegant pieces of apparatus. The insulating material consists of Mexican onyx but the utility of this switchboard even surpasses its beauty. In connection with this switchboard the doctor has a tank of compressed air and a means for manufacturing this compressed air in his laboratory. Instead of the old antiquated rubber syringe which smells strongly of alcohol and is liable to have the contamination of many mouths due to air being drawn into it, then exhausted out again, the doctor has a hot air syringe through which a blast of compressed air is allowed to pass, which has been previously heated by electricity. The value to patients of this syringe is immense, owing to its sanitary condition, its freedom from objectionable odors, and also from the fact that it does not cause pain like the old syringe. The advantage to the dentist is even more so, as the value of his time and the value of his patient's time is greatly enhanced because better and quicker work can be done and many gold fillings can be put in of better quality even without the use of the rubber dam by keeping the cavity absolutely dry with this syringe.

For inspection purposes the doctor has little electric lamps that the minutest detail can be seen anywhere in the mouth. This is one of the greatest assets against poor workmanship. To fill the root of a tooth it is essential to have the root thoroughly dry beforehand and this is absolutely impossible with the old methods and troubles due to improper filling of teeth was due to the fact that the dentist was never sure whether the root was properly dried out

before filling. The electric root canal dryer eliminates any chance of this happening. There are many other instruments such as electric cautery, electric wax spatula, gutta percha instruments, all of which are very useful to the up-to-date man.

We commend Dr. Irvine for his bringing an equipment so highly beneficial within the reach of the people of Lindsay.

Another change forced him to move up town to the old Beall building, where he has been steadily till the new Beall block was erected on the same site.

From the small venture of eighteen years ago Mr. Carroll has built it up into one of the largest wholesale and retail businesses in the Midland district. As a wholesale business it covers not only the county but a large surrounding district as well, while the retail end of the business enjoys the cream of the Lindsay trade.

The Carroll tobacco store enjoys the distinction of being the first exclusively tobacco store in Lindsay, and today stands unique as the only one devoting its whole attention to the tobacco trade. Every well known brand of tobaccos, pipes, cigars and cigarettes is handled, as well as a long list of all kinds of smokers' sundries. In fact if it is in any way related to smoking one is sure to find it at Carroll's cigar store, even though other places do not handle the articles sought for.
