#### NOTED CARDINAL DEAD AT SEVENTY

#### Rampolla Was Possible Successor to Pope Pius

ROME, Dec. 17 .- Cardinal Rampolla, former Papal Secretary of

State, died last night. Carlinal Mariano Rampolia (Count del Tindaro) was born at Polizzi, Sicily, in August, 1843. He entered the Papal service in 1870; became counsellor of the Papal Embassy at Madrid in 1875, and Papal Nuncio at Madrid in 1882. He became Cardinal-priest and the Secretary of State in 1887.

Cardinal Rampolla was appointed

Secretary of State by Pope Leo XIII., and at the conclave for the election of a successor to Pope Leo was the predominant figure until Austria exercised an old prerogative, the right to enter an objection to the election of a given candidate for the Papacy. Cardinal Rampolla led on the first and

second votes. Of late Cardinal Rampolla figured as a possible successor to Pope Pius. Since the conclave Cardinal Rampolla had lived in retirement in the Palace of St. Martha, just behind St. Peter's, and had devoted his time to the departments dealing with matters of doctrine, dogma, and internal administration of the Church, holding aloof from affairs pertaining to the foreign
