TOOK LEAVE OF PETERBORO

VEN. ARCHDEACON CASEY HAS LEFT FOR LINDSAY.

Congregation's Farewell - They Presented Him with an Address and \$300 in Gold-An Interesting Ceremony.

[Peterboro, Examiner, Saturday.] Ven. Archdeacon Casey, who for the past eight years has performed the duties of Rector of St. Peter's Cathedral, left this morning for Lindsay, having been transferred to the charge of St. Mary's church in that town.

Ever since the announcement of his removal from town Ven. Archdeacon Casey has been the recipient of many expressions of good will for his future. The various societies for which he has labored during his residence in Peterboro, the educational institutions with which he has been identified, have taken advantage of Ven. Archdeacon Casey's intended departure to express to him their appreciation of his efforts on behalf of his people.

Last night in the Cathedral the last of these presentations was made, when at the conclusion of the benediction Ven. Archdeacon Casey was presented with an address and a purse of \$300 from the congregation.

THE ADDRESS. The address was read by Mr. D. O'Connell, and the presentation of the \$300 was made by Mr. H. LeBrun, on behalf of the congregation.

The committee which had charge of the getting up of the presentation advanced to the front of the Cathedral and Mr. O'Connell read the address in a clear and audible voice.

The Cathedral was filled with members of the congregation, and the service was very impressive.

The address was as appended:

To the Very Reverend Archdeacon Dominick Jeremiah Casey, Rector of St. Peter's Cathedral. Very Reverend and Dear Sir,-Eight years ago you assumed the responsible duties of Rector of St. Peter's Cathedral, and during that time your indefatigable zeal and your great earnestness and tender solicitude in the spiritual and temporal welfare of your parishioners have won for you their love and admiration. Now upon the eve of your departure we do not allow you to leave us without giving expression to the deep sense of regret felt at their loss and the appreciation and gratitude they have for the great benefits they have derived from your able and efficient administration.

EDITORIAL NOTES.

In 1897 our government savings bank deposits were \$1,994,565; last year they were \$68,712,057. This country has made some progress since Confederation.

About a year from now, perhaps less than that, people will be taking the trip from North Bay to Temiskaming over the Ontario Government railway, which will bring lots of trade to Toronto and Ontario. Mr. Ross is a Premier who does things.

The conservative majority in the Senate has almost disappeared. At the present time the upper Chamber is composed of 43 conservatives and 34 liberals. Senator Prowse's recent death increases the vacancies to four. These will be filled by the appointment of supporters of the government, so that when parliament meets the liberals will number 38, as against 43 conservatives. This would give the opposition an apparent majority of five. As, however, a number of conservative Senators may be unable to attend, owing to their advanced age, it is quite possible that the coming session may witness a liberal majority in the Senate on a straight party vote for the first time for many years. When the four vacancies in the Senate have been filled, it will make thirty appointments to the Senate by the Laurier government in five and a half years, as against 11 appointments by conservative ministers in 18 years.

Charters for the construction of 1,046 miles of electric railways have been applied for to the Ontario legislature, the applications having been made by twelve different companies. The territory sought to be covered extends from Cornwall to Windsor, and the lines would be continuous between those two points, except from Glenora to Tecumseh. To the north it is proposed to construct another system from London to Owen Sound, along the shore of Lake Huron. Then there are a number of rural lines projected to radiate from Hamilton to Toronto, Guelph to Waterloo, and although many of these schemes may be still-born, there are yet enough likely to be consummated to effect profound changes in the character of the rural districts. The transportation facilities that the lines projected would give to the hitherto remote farmer could not fail to increase the value of his products, by putting him into close touch with the principal markets, especially as many of the districts concerned are but poorly served if at all with railways at the present time.
