MR. CARNEGIE'S GIFT.

It is cause for general congratulation on the part of our citizens that Lindsay has commenced to share in the larger benevolences of the age. The magnificent gift of a County Hospital, now approaching completion, will perpetuate the name of the donor, Mr. James Ross, of Montreal, a former citizen, who will be able to derive a kenn satisfaction from his generous act owing to his knowledge of our great need for an Institution of the kind and the untold benefit it will confer upon the people of South and North Victoria. In addition to the more material advantages the building will embellish the town from an architectural point of view, and will constitute the town's principal attraction in the eyes of our visitors.

Now: we have the welcome an-

nonncement that Mr. Andrew Carnegie, the retired steel magnate, who is bestowing his wealth in grants to aducational institutions and Public Libraries, has looked favorably upon the request forwarded some months ago on behalf of Lindsay, and has signified his willingness to grant \$10,000 for a model Free Publie Library building on condition that a free site is secured and \$1,000 yearly guaranteed for maintenance. The Library Board is already assured of the revenue, being entitled to a half-mill on the total assessment of the town, which will this year exceed \$2,000,000 for the first time, and as the town owns several suitable sites the grant is practically earned at the present moment. The amount is sufficient to erect and equip a very fine Library building, the plans for which, we understand, are furnished by the donor. It is Important that the site be selected with a view to the town's growth and future needs, and the choice should not be made hastily. It is just possible that some generous citigan may make the task easy by donating a site.
