Rolling Stock Set in Motion by Earthquake Shooks.

SEISMIC DISTURBANCES DAILY.

Andijan, in Russian Central Asia, th Scene of the Shocks-The People Will Not Leave District Lyon For Earthquakes-The City to Be Rebuilt-Suffering Being Relieved.

St. Petersburg, Dec. 26 .- According to the latest advices from Andiian, Russian Central Asia, the shocks of earthquakes are continuing there. There have been four or five seismic disturbances daily, and a particularly violent series of shocks during the night of Dec. 22, and the following morning set all the rolling stock on the railway in motion, resulting in a panic among the railway men. Traffic is still suspended on the railway. and the station is closed. The military authorities are taking over the control of line for some distance from Andijan.

The damage resulting from the recent earthquake amounts to several million of dollars. The temperature has fallen to freezing point and thousands of persons are homeless.

One section of the city has been completely destroyed; one cotton gin and one church only are standing. The first shock drove the inhabitants generally indoors, otherwise the loss of life would have been much greater. The people of the stricken city are accepting the situation stoically. Notwithstanding the offers of free transportation they are remaining in the vicinity of the city, which will be rebuilt. A substantial start has been made in the collection of a re-

Andijan is a cotton centre and exports 40,000,000 pounds of cotton annually. The population, numbering 56,000 souls, was growing rapidly. The people, who are mainly Sarts, were engaged in cotton raising and ginning. Of twenty gins nineteen have been destroyed. Sarts are not like Russians. They are private owners of land, but live in cities and towns. The houses Andijan are principally one-storey high, and are built of unburned brick.

The War Department here says that everything possible is being done to relieve suffering. Barracks in which the population will be housed, are being built.
