THREE NEW CHARGES PREFERRED. Alfred McDougall Committed For Trial

at Assize Court. Toronto, Dec. 20 .- Alfred McDougall, ex-solicitor to the Provincial Treasury, appeared in the Police Court yesterday. He appeared to be very weak, and took no part in the proceedings. Three new charges theft from the Government were preferred. In the two first cases Mr. McDougall is charged with stealing cheques for \$390 and for \$6,564.83. The first of the new charges is concerning a cheque dated April 28, 1899, for \$239.10, made by John W. Maws on the Canadian Bank of Commerce at Paris, payable to the order

of Harley & Sweet, and endorsed by them in favor of Mr. McDougall. The second new charge deals with a cheque dated Nov. 8, 1897, for \$1,849.92, made by Philip Holt on the Bank of Commerce at Goderich

in favor of Mr. McDougall. The third refers to a cheque dated April 28, 1902, for \$16,000 made by Jeminia Hall on the Merchants' Bank at Ottawa, payable to Mr.

McDougall. J. H. Macdoanld, K. C., who appeared for McDougall waived amination on all five charges, agreeing to a commitment for trial at the January Assizes.

HAN TEMPESTUOUS VOYAGE,

Allan Liner Bavarian Delayed by F .gs on Nova Scotian Coast-She Brought the Scottish Curlers.

Halifax, N. S., Dec. 29.-The Allan Line steamer Bavarian arrived at 10 o'clock yesterday morning. She had a tempestuous voyage and was much delayed by fogs on this coast. For the last three days the sun was not seen. It is believed among the passengers that the steamer almost struck White Rock, off Eastern Nova Scotia, but that she was in the slightest danger the officers deny. The team of Scottish curlers, representing the Royal Caledonian Club, arrived by her for a tour in Canada and the United States. One of the curlers, Andrew Smith, had his kneecap fractured four days ago and will not be able to play. He went to the hospital here. This will leave five rinks, with three spare men. The first competition between Halifax and Scotland will take place on Wednesday. On Thursday and Friday it will be all Nova Scotia against Scotland.

Reprimanded by Her Employer on Saturday in Buffalo This Canadian Girl Deliberately Hanged Herself.

Buffalo, Dec. 28 .- Angry because she was reprimanded by her employer, Hattie Gauge, 15 years old, hung herself to a gas pipe in the basement of the apartment house at No. 212 Maryland street late Saturday after-

The dead girl was one of children, and up to the time of the opening of the Pan-American Exposition lived with her parents at No. 179 Church street, St. Catharines, Then she came to Buffalo and secured employment as a servant with Dr. R. Feetham in the Maryland street apartment house.

Last night Mr. Feetham told the police the girl had been inclined to be wayward, and he had occasion to reprimand her frequently. the scoldings she had always been in a bad humor, and several times Mr. Feetham had threatened to let her

At noon Saturday he came home from work for his dinner. Mr. Feetham found her out in the street throwing snowballs with a crowd of boys. She had on Mr. Feetham's ulster, and when she saw him coming she dashed into the house. Mr. Feetham followed her, and when he saw she had neglected her work he reprimanded her severely. Finally he threatened to send her back to her parents in St. Catharines, and this she began to cry, saying that he would never do that.

Then the girl prepared his lunch for him, and about an hour later Mr. Feetham returned to his work. Nothing more was seen of the girl until just about 6 o'clock when Janitor George P. Fales visited the basement and found her hanging to one of the gas pipies along the ceiling. She had fastened one end of a clothes-line about her neck and then, standing on a small soap box, had secured the other end to the pipe. Then she had kicked the box away and slowly strangled to death.
