## New Dredge for Trent Valley Canal.

The Dominion Government will this winter build a new dredge to be used on the river below Hastings. The dredge will be one of the best on the Trent waters. Some of the timbers that will be used in the construction of the dredge have been brought from British Columbia. Several pieces of the timber are 70 feet in length and occupied two cars in transit.

## THREE NEW CHAIRS PREPARED.

Alfred McDougall Committed For Trial at Assize Court.

Toronto, Dec. 20.—Alfred McDougall, ex-solicitor to the Provincial Treasury, appeared in the Police Court yesterday. He appeared as a witness, and took no part in the proceedings. Three new charges of theft from the Government were preferred. In the two first cases Mr. McDougall is charged with stealing cheques for \$390 and for \$6,564.88.

The first of the new charges is concerning a cheque dated April 28, 1899, for \$239.10, made by John W. Laws on the Canadian Bank of Commerce at Paris, payable to the order of Harley & Sweet, and endorsed by them in favor of Mr. McDougall.

The second new charge deals with a cheque dated Nov. 8, 1897, for \$1,849.92, made by Philip Holt on the Bank of Commerce at Goderich in favor of Mr. McDougall.

The third refers to a cheque dated April 28, 1902, for \$16,000 made by Jemima Hall on the Merchants' Bank at Ottawa, payable to Mr. McDougall.

J. H. Macdonald, K. C., who appeared for McDougall waived examination on all five charges, agreeing to a commitment for trial at the January Assizes.

## OVER WIRELESS.

Marconi Sends Christmas Greetings to His Directors in London.

Halifax, N. S., Dec. 26.—Wireless messages sent in Italian by Signor Marconi to General Brusiloff, first aide-de-camp to the King of Italy, to the lady-in-waiting to the Queen Dowager Margherita, and to the Italian Minister of Marine, have been received at Poldhu, Cornwall, by operators who have no knowledge of the Italian language. This is regarded as an interesting proof of the correctness with which messages may be transmitted.

This message was sent yesterday by Marconi to the directors of the Marconi Wireless Telegraph Company in London:

"My best Christmas wishes to my co-directors and their families, sent by
