LINDSAY ELECTED A FULL LABOR TICKET

The Workingmen of the Town Scored a Great Triumph in the Municipal Elections Monday.

MR. J. H. SOOTHERAN GAINS THE COVETED MAYORALTY

A Very Large Vote Polling—The Public Library By-Law Defeated by a Small Majority, and the Good Roads By-Law by a Large One—Mr. Staples Snowed Under by Mr. Flavelle in the Race for Water Commissioner—Returns from Ops and Mariposa.

Monday, Jan. 6th, 1903, was a great day for the workingmen of Lindsay and the Socialist element of our population, and they have full warrant for the satisfaction that is to-day animating their ranks and permeating their conversation. Why shouldn't they exult? Have they not demonstrated their power by electing a full ticket for Council and affording a convincing proof that a new force has entered the municipal arena and will have to be reckoned with in future.

The local Labor Union are to be congratulated on the fact that they selected good men and supported their right loyalty. It is likely that, unless assured of such solid support, some of the candidates would not have offered, and the Union may fairly claim the credit of having discovered new material of a quality acceptable to the general ratepayer, because the vote shows that the Union nominees were heartily supported by all citizens.

The Majority Contest. Mr. J. H. Sotheran's large majority over his opponent, Mr. Geo. Ingle, came as a surprise to many, but the result was not unexpected by the keen judges of such contests. Mr. Ingle's defeat was not due to any loss of popularity, but mainly to the fact that he was offering for a third turn in the face of a somewhat unreasonable yet deep-rooted antipathy against any occupant of the civic chair being permitted to complete the term associated with the mystic number three.

Mr. Sotheran, the new Mayor, is to be applauded for the persistence he has shown in his determination to serve the public. He has submitted to rebuffs which would have discouraged any ordinary man, only to bob up again, smiling and debonair, and fully resolved to apply and persevere in the face of the vagaries of the public mind. The way best calculated to make his next attempt successful. His course represented pluck, commanded admiration, and invited support. A good organizer, he promptly realized the advantages likely to accrue from identification with the labor vote. He secured entry into the Union, and although his most ardent supporter would feel at a loss if asked to state where his interests ran parallel with those of the working class, especially in these prosperous times, he managed to maintain his foothold and defeat several attempts to oust him from his position as the Union's nominee for the Mayoralty. These things testify to Mr. Sotheran's steadfastness of purpose. In other ways he managed also to rally the faithful about him, and reconcile conflicting forces, winning support not hitherto at his command.
