### OBITUARY.

nteresting Events in the Life of Mrs, John Fleury, Ops Township Pioneer. Now Deceased,

The last of the old pioneers of West Ors passed peacefully away on Jan. 5th. 1903, at the family residence, lot 14, con. 1, Ops, in the person of Mrs. John Flurey. Deceased, whose maider name was Tearney, was born in the County of Longford, Ireland, in the year 1810, and when seventeen years of age was married to John Florey, who had just received first-class certificate as school-

In the year 1831 she, with her husband and one child, sailed from Dublin Bay for wild America. When some three weeks at sea a violent storm arose which swelt the main mast off the ship and left it a floating helpless hulk of wood. It was thought that all would be lost, but their time had not come. The storm sub ided, the carpenters and sailors set to work and in two days they hoisted their sails again and continued their journey, landing in Quebec in eight weeks from the time they started. There they embarked on a tow-boat, the only mode of travelling in those days on the St. Lawrence between Quebec and Montreal. It took seven days to make the trip between the two cities. By a trange coincidence they did not then go all the way to Montreal. When three days and three nights on the ow-boat, which was nothing more han an open scow, it stopped for a short time at a place called Three Rivers. There was about an acre of clearance but no house is view -nothing but bush, sky and river to be seen. It was a warm morning in June and Mr. Flurey, who had just got relief by the breaking of a feion on his thumb, from which he had been suffering for several days, went ashore and, lying down in the shade of a tree, fell fast asieep. When he awoke he found, to his terrible surrrise, that the boat had gone, but on looking around he saw that his wife and little child were also with him on the shore, she having got their all-which consisted of a large wooden chest-removed from the boat, as the child was sick and likely to die, and she feared if it died on the boat it would be thrown into the water, as had been done with others while on board the ship. She cared not what harpened if they would only leave her on the land, that she might in some way bury

> The Panama Canal Negotiations. (Montreal Witness.)

The difference between the United States and Columbia in the Panama canal negotiations now mainly relate to the size of the annuity to be paid. The United States has increased its offer to ten million dollars casa and a hundred thousand dollars to y arly, but the Columbian government insists upon six hundred thousand dollars yearly. As according to the present draft of the treaty the term of the lease is for one hundred years, with privilege of renewal indefinitely at the sole option of the United States, the latter regards the annual tribute required by Colombia as much too high. The treaty however, calls for the concession to the United States of the costoms administration and revenue at the two terminal ports, as well as the lightbouse service, with no restrictions as to the customs tariff, tonnage dreg, light dues, and other sources of revence. Having the right to charge what it rleases, the United States will have every opportunity to reimburse herself for any annuities she pays to Colombia, says the latter.
