

HE GRAND TRUNK PACIFIC SUBSID AND THE TARIFF.

In the course of an address deliv ered before the Young Men's Liberal Club of Winnigeg last week Hon. Mr. Sifton made several interesting statements regarding the proposed Grand Trunk Pacific railroad and concerning the tariff. In its report of the meeting the Free Press says: In reference to the coming of the Grand Trunk, Mr. Sifton said that government was prepared to offer a moderate amount of assistance, if, as was expected, the new line would celp to prevent the congestion of traffic and oren up new territory for develorment. The opposition had stated that there would be a large land grant. This was not true. Absolutely no land would be given. Mr. Sifton said he had been kept busy adjusting the land grants given by former governments, and had no deside to add to his own troubles by giving more. The former proposals had not as yet been made by the Grand Trunk for aid, but what he had stated was practically the position the government propose taking on the matter.

Regarding the tari f, Mr. Sifton does not appear to entertain the views ascribed to him by Mr. Borden at the Amherst meeting some days ago. Mr. Sitten is in favor of a low tariff as against a nigh tariff, and he does not believe that the consumer should be bled to support industries which cannot get along without extreme protection. As Hen. Mr. Fielding said at Halifax, there may be cases in which slight alterations in the tariff have become necessary. Hon. Mr. Sifton devoted some attention to those who have criticized, not so much his tariff views, as those which they made for him:

Regarding the tariff generally, Mr. Sifton said he was no doctrinaire. The Ottawa Citizen was very angry with him because he was a rank free trader. In Winnipeg, the Telegram said he was a hide-bound protectionist in disguise. He believed the tari f should be adjusted from time to time to meet the changing needs of the coortry, just as a business man would just his business methods to meet new conditions. As a general principle he was in favor of low tariffs as against a higher, but if he saw a legitimate Canadian industry suffering through foreign competition, when a slight change of 4 or 5 per cent would save it from being wiped out, be was not prepared to say no would not consider a case of that kind, and consider it favorably.

The Tory orators and newspapers have been saying that the ministers represented all shades of tariff opinion. Their recent speeches show that they share one opinion, and it is on with which Canada is very well satisfied.

Searlet Fever Outbreak Stirring the

Board of Health to Activity. Early in December there occurred un outbreak of scarlet fever and diphtheria in Peterboro, and ever since the disease had been giving the authorities considerable trouble. As in Lindsay, it was found that some medical men failed to report suspicious cases in time, having been lulled into a state of false security by the fact that the disease had prevailed | early in the summer in a very mild form. Before the gravity of the situation was realized the disease had broken out in virulent type in 13 bomes, and so far the measures adopted have not been successful in stamp-

At the inaugural meeting of the Board of Health, held Monday evening, Mr. Robt. Neill, a leading citizen was elected chairman. The Examiner says he recommended that the board, together with the Sanitary Inspector, Chief Roszel, visit the schools' and public places, and look into their sanitary arrangements, and find out if possible the causes of the contagious diseases.

Mr. Eyres said that stringent measurers were needed, but the bottom of the cause must first be fathomed. The schools he said must be visited and inspected, but one thing above all else was that people with disease ought to be made to report at once; Severe punishment should be meted out to all defaulters in this respect. After the case had been reported it ought to be quite isolated.

Chief Roszei gave his opinion that the cause of the recent scourge was the bad well water. The ground in Peterboro was porous, and the sewage I ran into the wells, thus making the water most undesirable for domestic

Mr. R. Neill, chairman, thought that a member of the Provincial Board of Health should be asked to come to Peterboro, and have the well water analyzed as soon as possible. Dr. McNulty said that only one case had been reported since the 12th, and he did not think the Provincial

Health Officer could give n very satisfactory report. The germ scarlet fever had not yet been discovered, and the analyization of the well water would not prove that scarlet fever was due to bad water. Chief Roszel said that he was sure if the people were told the well wated was bad they would close their wells and use city water as soon as it could be connected. Mr. Armstrong thought that com-

plete disinfection ought to be insisted upon after the disease... Chairman Neill left for the yesterday evening to interview Hon. L R. Stratton and request that a member of the Provincial Board of

Health be sent to Peterboro to institute effective measures for the stamping out of the disease.
