Peterboro's Fever Outbreak.

Examiner, Wednesday: On Monday Dr. Bingham, Medical Health Of. ficer, and Chief Rosgel, Health Inspector, made a tour of inspection of the town, to investigate the condition of alfairs in relation to the scarlet fever outbreak. They found that all the parties afflicted had either recovered or were out of danger, and the conclusion was arrived at that the outbreak was practically over, and the danger point of further infection passed. No new case has been reported since the 12th of January. The visit revealed an interesting fact in connection with the water. They found that out of the thirteen families afflicted with searlet fever, hine used well water and four city water, from which circumstance the deduction was natural that the water of the wells was far from whole. some ..... This finding is in line with the investigations of Dr. McAlpine, Medical Health Officer, of this townwho a courle of years ago reported to the board that of a number of cases of fever during the twelve months, not one could be traced to the use of city water.
