REGISTRATION OF BIRTHS.

A more stringent effort is to be made for the prompt registration of births throughout the Province. With this end in view a circular letter from the deputy registrar-general has been sent out, giving instructions to the registrars to make considerable work to comply with: Ascertain from local physicians what births have occurred in their several practices during the previous six months; examine the registration records; the clergy, check over births in newspapers for the past six months; encourage local newspapers to emphasize the necessity of parents registering all births within their parishes; their department of any case of parents refusing to register births.

PETERBORO'S FEVER OUTBREAK.

Examiner, Wednesday: On Monday Dr. Bingham, Medical Health Officer, and Chief Rosell, Health Inspector, made a tour of inspection of the town, to investigate the condition of affairs in relation to the scarlet fever outbreak. They found that all the parties afflicted had either recovered or were in danger, and the contagion was arrested at that point. The outbreak was practically over, and the danger point of further infection passed. No new cases have been reported since the 12th of January.

LINDSAY PRESBYTERIAL SOCIETY.

The twenty-first annual meeting of the Lindsay Presbyterian Society was held in the Presbyterian church, Cambridge on Jan. 20th. The attendance was large, and the delegates were hospitably entertained by the Uxbridge branch of the society during their stay in that town.
