dences of feelings of regret over the sudden death in London, England, yesterday afternoon of Andrew Pattullo, M.P.P. It is the intention of the relatives to have the remains brought here for interment.

The late Mr. Pattullo was 53 years and removed to Oxford when a very young boy, settling with his lather in Blenheim township. He was educated in the public school and in the Dundas High School and the Catharines Collegiate Institute. ter winning the Gilchrist scholarship, he commenced the study of law London, but was compelled to give it up on account of ill-health.

In 1875 he entered upon a news-

paper career with The Woodstock Scatinel. In 1880 he assumed control of the paper, which afterwards became The Sentinel-Review. twenty years he was recognized as one of the ablest editors west of Toronto. He was president of the Canadian Press Association in 1890, 1891 and 1892. For years he was a power in the Reform party in the political campaigns in Oxford, and was a very able platform speaker. In 1898 he succeeded the late Sir Oliver Mowat as the member of the Provincial Legislature for North Ox-,ord, and has since represented this riding in the Ontario House. Three months ago Mr. Pattullo retired from his newspaper duties and proceeded to England as an observer of the Chamberlain campaign. There, however, he entered upon the work of assisting Mr. Chamberlain, and for the past month has been addressing meetinbs in support of the fiscal policy advocated by Mr. Chamberlain. Mr. Pattullo is survived by one brother, G. R. Pattullo of Woodstock, and three sisters, Mrs. Laidlaw of Hamilton, Mrs. Findlay of Barrie and Mrs. Short of Chicago. His wife, formerly Miss Isabel Balmer of Oakville, died in 1895. Apart from his newspaper work, Mr. tullo interested himself five years ago in the system of good roads, and addressed many meetings in the vince.
