Pittsburgh, Dec. 29.—Notices were sent out by the Amalgamated Association of Iron and Steel and Tin Workers that the vote of the sheet metal workers on Sunday to reduce wages from the scale of 3 to 3 1/2 cents, thereby cutting wages 10 per cent., has been accepted. The new rate will result in the starting of a large number of union sheet metal plants that have been idle for a long time. To Extradite Abel. The application sets forth that Abel is wanted here on the charge of forgery in the third degree, and requests the Governor to seek proper extradition from the authorities at Washington. Twenty First Victim Dead. Grand Rapids, Mich., Dec. 29.—Gerritt Mottman died yesterday at the United Benevolent Association Hospital from injuries sustained the previous night.
