**THE L. C. I. HOCKEY TEAM**

**DEFEATED A STRONG PETERBORO AGGREGATION LAST FRIDAY.**

Visitors were confident of winning, but were beaten 7-3.

The Lindsay Collegiate Institute septets won a great game from the Peterboro Front Valley League team last Friday. The game was witnessed by about two hundred spectators, and the ice was in the pink of condition. For roughness, mix-ups, hard checking, last night's game surpassed anything we have yet seen on Lindsay ice. The Peterboros commenced roughing it at first, so the Collegians retaliated, and as a result the spectators saw a game that furnished plenty of amusement.

According to arrangements made, the school boys were to play the Peterboro Junior O. H. A. team, but to their surprise and disappointment a much stronger and heavier team put in an appearance. This team came over to have a practice preparatory to playing a league game on Monday, and at the same time achieve a victory. They got the practice and lots of it, for the school boys played a hard game, but our lads were out to win and when the game ended the score was 7 to 3 in favor of Lindsay.

The game was interesting from a spectator's standpoint, for those who enjoy rough playing, but good clean hockey it was out of the question. Last night's game was far from being satisfactory, and it was to have clean play in the town, that the game must be dispensed with. Play started at 8:30 sharp. The Collegians got the rubber and threatened their opponents' goal, but were stopped, and Lindsay's goal was shot at. Lindsay's goal was shot at, but without much success. Finally the visitors displayed some pretty "com." and scored just eight minutes after commencing. The next goal went to Lindsay, two minutes later, the locals scoring in a face-off in front of Peterboro's nets. In three and a half minutes the local lads added two more, Ferguson and McDonald doing the beautiful in some pretty rush work. The visitors then got to work and scored two goals in ten and four minutes respectively. For the next few minutes the visitors' goal was under attack, but the locals were unable to score and the half ended a tie-3 all.

On resuming play the visitors went on the ice short a player, Ford being unable to play owing to a broken skate. So the Peterboros played six skaters to Lindsay's seven. As the game progressed roughness developed, tripping and body checking being much in evidence. It was seen, however, that the visitors were not in as good a condition as the locals, who were putting up a great game. The visitors were heavy men and checked hard, but lacked speed and combination play, while on the other hand the school boys got in some beautiful "com." work. In this half Peterboro were unable to score but Lindsay four in two, twelve, eight and three minutes. During the half several players were penalized for fouling and the car fanning was put out of the game for deliberate tripping and McPherson was on the fence also, so at one stage of the game Lindsay was playing seven men to Peterboro's five.

Jack McDonald put up a star game for the school boys. His is a very fast skater and a daisy shot on goal. McGrath, in the nets, put up his usual good play, but we must remind him that it is not good form to indulge in pugilistic encounters. No matter how strong the provocation may have been, it is not good taste to display rowdiness, especially in a place where there are so many ladies. It is to be hoped that another scrap like that won't occur in Lindsay ice in any future hockey games. Ferguson, McDonald, Boyd Sylvester and Kilbuck, put up the game of their lives—they were always after the goal. McGrath's "com." was pretty good at times. Joe Duffus is as good as ever at cover. He broke many a rush last night, and played a magnificent game. Koyl held point down well and made several rushes.

McLean, for the visitors, was a star, his lifting being a feature. McPherson and Comstock proved a tower of strength on Peterboro's defence. Cameron and Lee worked in some fine combination play. Chris Graham did some hard checking. He was responsible for the mix-up with McGrath and it is to be hoped he will play the puck—and not the man—the next time he visits Lindsay.

The Canadian Pacific Railway should be building more engines, coaches, and freight cars. Its inability to supply cars as they are needed in the West and the car famine everywhere prove the truth of this.

In Ontario the G.T.R. is notoriously undermanned for the work done on its lines. The railway plants of the country are not growing in any thing like the same proportion as the business they are called upon to do. The inadequacy of the railways grows more noticeable all the time.

The big companies should lumber up. They should recognize that the old order has passed away and they should be glad to know it.

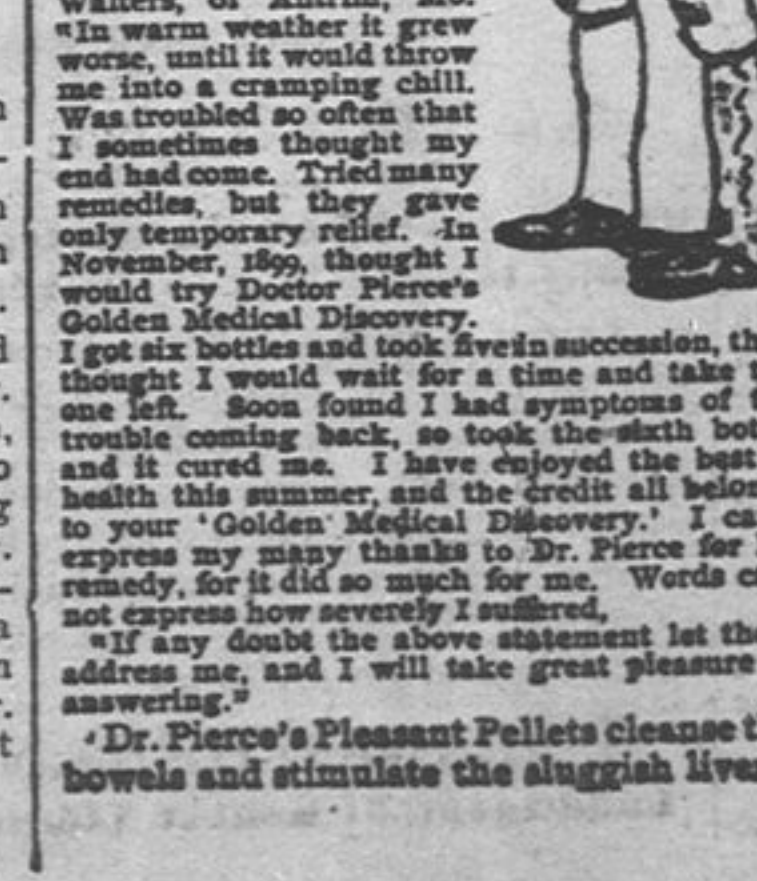

**FORMER LINDSAY PASTOR DEAD.**

The Late Rev. Walter Ayers, one of the oldest preachers in the ministry of the Canadian Methodist church, died very suddenly at his home, Bruce St., London, Ont., on Monday night, Dec. 28th. The deceased gentleman had not been feeling in the best of health for ten days past, and was quite ill just before the end came, but that death was near at hand had not entered the mind of anyone. Acute gastritis was the cause of illness, but he had shown improvement until Monday evening, when he again complained. Medical aid was summoned, but he was suddenly taken with an apoplectic seizure and expired almost instantly.

Although upon the superannuated list for the past two years, Rev. Mr. Ayers was a remarkably vigorous and active man. He had attained the allotted span of life, but in all respects appeared hale and hearty and frequently preached or gave addresses.

A native of Devonshire, England, deceased early came to this country and labored as a faithful minister in the Methodist church. Thirteen years of his ministry were spent in the United States, including Cleveland, the Lake Superior country, Wisconsin, Michigan and Illinois. He was ordained in Hamilton, Ont., and was stationed early in his ministry at Lindsay, Rowanville, Port Hope, Chesley, Fisherton, Sarnia and Windsor. When he was superannuated, Mr. Ayers purchased a property on Bruce St., and became connected with the Akin St. Methodist church, where he was known as a kind and generous man. His kindly and abundant good spirits caused him to be a general favorite among young and old, and his sudden departure will be mourned by a great many here, as well as in other places. He was noted among the ministry for his ability as an organizer, and not a few fine church buildings in the land owe much to him for the fact of their existence.

**CUMULATIVE SYSTEM ALL RIGHT**

Directors of Bureau of Labor Says It is a Success.

Toronto World: Robert Gloukling, director of the Bureau of Labor, does not regard the recent test of the cumulative system of voting as an indication of its failure. He said the system was not perfect, but was a long step in the direction of proportional voting, which had been in operation in Australia and found satisfactory. The failure of the labor body to elect their representatives, Mr. Gloukling thought was due to the lack of organization. There was no labor party, and it was a mistake to imagine that the laboring body would support men just because they were labelled "labor party." They all had their party affiliations, and other considerations prevented a true test of the numerical strength of the labor vote.

Hon. Richard Harcourt, Minister of Education, said the result of the voting Monday had been what was claimed for the cumulative system, so that so far it has been a success.

**Editor of the Star:** Are you not asking too much of any voting system when you expect it to keep all bad men out of the Council or Legislature? If, as you say, good citizens can elect several good men, and the corporations can elect one man, is he not the minority? The point, then, is to strengthen and improve the good men, who form the majority, and this can best be done by a system which enables a voter to concentrate on the man he is strongly interested in without being compelled to throw away his vote on candidates he cares not for.

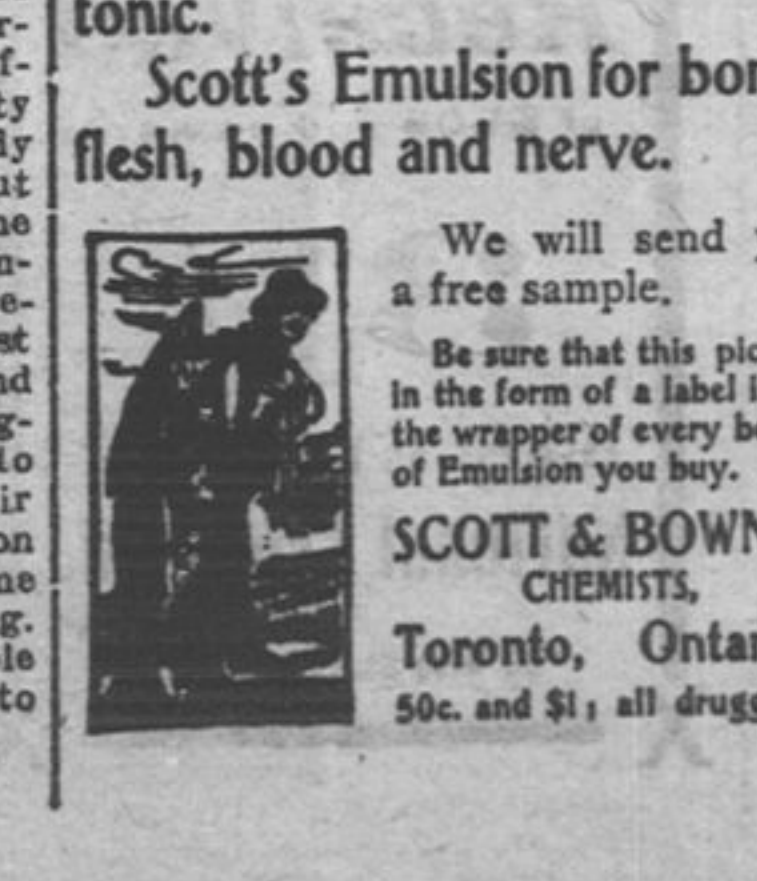

**MAN ACCUSED OF BIGAMY OBTAINS THE MARRIAGE LAW IN HIS DEFENCE.**

A little over three years ago the people of Fenelon Falls and vicinity revealed in a little social gossip over a peculiar case of matrimonial separation. A farmer named Worley and his wife became estranged and agreed to part company for the rest of their lives. The property and progeny were divided according to scripture, the wife receiving one-third of both. There were three children, four of whom were taken by Worley, the other two being taken away by the woman with her allowance of the property sale. The woman afterwards married one John Prentiss, who lived in September last. Prentiss died at Cooktown, and shortly after a man named John Worley offered his services as step-father to the family of three children, which was accepted. Worley and the woman are now under arrest and on trial at Toronto for bigamy. When the case was called before Col. Denison on Monday Mrs. Worley produced a separate paper signed by her first husband, which she thought gave her a perfect right to marry again, according to the scriptures. When Prentiss took the box he produced a bible and read the 24th chapter of Leviticus as follows: "When a man hath taken a wife and married her, and it come to pass that she find no favor in his eyes because he hath found some uncleanness in her, then let him write her a bill of divorce, and give it in her hand and send her out of his house. And when she is departed out of his house, she may go and be another man's wife: and this law shall stand in the day that the Lord shall send his blessing upon Israel." The Magistrate stated that the Mosaic law, the ancient Jewish law, and the Canadian Criminal Code came into conflict, the latter providing that no man or woman shall marry again legally divorced by act of parliament. He adjourned the case till later.
