—Mr. John Duquette, of the Grand Union Hotel, and Miss Massaw, eldest daughter of Mr. T. Massaw, Lindsay, last week were united in marriage at Fenelon Falls.

—The Silver Lake (Galway) correspondent of the Bobcaygeon Independent notes that a large moose deer passed through that settlement the other day, heading east towards Bass Lake.

—Toronto Star: A man up the country was struck by a train and killed, which is the only evidence produced of late that there is yet an occasional burst of speed on the branch lines.

—The town street lighting system was in operation for the first time Monday night, and pleased expressions were heard on all sides. Every-thing worked well and the town looked its best.

—Another touch of Arctic cold. Several reliable thermometers registered 22 below zero at an early hour Monday a.m. At 7 o'clock the Simpson house thermometer indicated 26 degrees below.

—Efforts are being put forward to secure the services of the great English entertainer, Mr. George Reginald, for one performance in Lindsay. We sincerely hope they will prove successful.

—At high mass at St. Mary's church Sunday the announcement was made that the Christmas gift of the congregation to Ven. Archdeacon Wood, which reached the unprecedented sum of \$633.50.

—Inspector Knight will be glad to receive reports from the following schools: Ops. S.S. Nos. 7 and 9; East Lindsay, S.S. Nos. 8, 9 and 11; Werrulam, S.S. Nos. 2, 10 and 12; Somerville, S. S. No. 7; Omemee and Bobcaygeon.

—Mr. W. J. Moore, stock buyer, is paying \$5 per 100 for live hogs to be shipped this week. This is a high price above the market quotations, but he finds the Thursday market in Toronto better than that on Friday.

—The Mindful Echo says the unprecedented snowfall this winter has already buried the north country. The snow is three feet on the level and six feet deep on the roads in places. The mail carriers are having a dreadful time.

—Agricultural implement men are muttering harsh things about the weather and the state of the roads. They say they have to do a lot of driving every week and it is impossible to get around at present with any degree of comfort.

—Mr. James Quillan, a prominent resident of Niagara Falls, and one of the founders of the C. M. B. A. in Canada, died suddenly Saturday night of heart failure. He was a member of the Dominion Finance committee of the order.

—Railway men tell some queer tales of hardship and heavy snow. One night lately a freight train (train drawn by three engines was held up for nine hours on the road between Lindsay and a station 17 miles north-west.

—Lindsay carriers are out of the running for the Ontario Tankard this year, as a result of their defeat in Peterboro Jan. 14th. After winning the Peterboro Tankard in 1903, they lost to the Peterboro Thistles last afternoon by two points.

—The Espen Falls Water Power & Electric Co., Espen Falls, Ont., have incorporated with a capital of \$500,000 to generate and supply electricity for lighting and heating purposes, etc. The project is being carried out by A. O. Boggs, Oklawaha, Ontario.

—A number of our young people enjoyed a pleasant drive to Oakwood last week. A basket school was given in aid of the Public Library and was largely attended. The social was held at the home of Mr. James Thorndyke. The young people had a good time and danced till the small hours of the morning.

—Dr. Donnan Fraser, of Lakeside, died on Friday after a long illness from pneumonia. Graduating from Trinity Medical School in 1874, being a first class student, he practised in Lakeside for some years and then went to England. **Railway Notes.**

—The Wabash Railway Co. will locate their Canadian workshops in St. Thomas, Ont.

—The Temiskaming & Northern Ontario Railway are having built 1,200 flat cars by Rhoads, Curry & Co., Amherst, N. S., for delivery in May. An order has also been placed for 500 box cars.

—Orill Times: Starting with the wreck in which James Mount lost his life near Gomebridge a couple of months ago, wrecks have been of almost weekly occurrence in this vicinity. A week or so later Ed. Lyons lost his life at Allendale, then came the wreck of Silver Creek in which a dozen cars were smashed; next Engineer Glassford and Patton lost their lives near Barrie; last week three engines were demolished at Allendale; and now the latest near Uthoff. Surely there are busy times on the G. T. R. about here.

—Mr. Wm. Whyte, second vice-president of the C. P. R., has declared war on the "Train Late" nuisance and has issued an iron clad circular to all trainmen on the Pacific and B. C. division regarding the necessity of a better service. We recommend the first clause to the attention of the Grand Trunk management: Passenger trains have been made more annoying to passengers by traveling slowly and stopping so often that having to wait at stations for late trains. The road has earned a very unpopulable reputation for the running of its passenger trains.
