Threatened to Burn Him Out.

REMAINED AROUND CALGARY

Took the Chances, Me Said, to Melp His Brother John-Was Well Informed of the Mevements of the Police and All That Went on -Bis Execution on

Calgary, Alberta, Jan. 25.-Ernest Cashel, the condemned murderer, who made such a daring escape from police barracks guard room here, was captured yesterday afternoon by the Mounted Police about six miles northeast of Calgary. He is now in the guardroom and will be hanged on Tuesday. Cashel gave the police a chase for forty-five days, and during that time has not been more than six miles away from the city at any one time and during a portion of the time he was in the city. The police learned of his supposed whereabouts two weeks ago, and have been quietly keeping watch until yesterday when his capture was effected without great trouble.

Cashel was game to the last, and did not give up without a struggle. Constable Biggs found his man concealed in one corner of the cellar of Pitman's house. He held a light to the corner, whereupon Cashel fired a revolver, the bullet grazing the comstable's head. Another shot also failed, and Biggs retired from the message, and a large number stood cellar, as he was unarmed. Procurup. The meeting came to a close ing a revolver, Biggs returned to the cellar, but was met on the dark stairs by Cashel, and further shots exchanged, only one taking effect, as it lodged in Cashel's heel.

Boolde to Burn Him Out. The murderer retreated to the cellar corner and the police retired outside, when it was decided to burn the building. Cashel called out he would kill himself and merely wanted to leave a letter for his mother. He fired several shots, but the police would stand no bluffing and warned him out of the building. Cashel finally emerged with his hands in the air, and was soon placed under arrest, and is now ledged in his old cell at the police barracks. He said he had complete knowledge of everything that was happening, and did not want to leave the country until his brother was released. Cashel murdered Rufus Holt. His

escape from the jail at Calgary, Dec. 10, the day before he was to have been executed, was a most daring escapade. With two revolvers smuglove, he held up the three officers while still handcuffed. The men were driven into the cell in which the prisoner had been confined, and forced to throw to him the key to the manacles. He had been permitted to

leave his cell for exercise. A reprieve had just been refused, but before the date of the execution the hanging had been postponed until Jan. 26. Without this postponement, Cashel would have been dead in law, after the date of his proposed execution, and could not have been further molested if captured. Mrs. Bechtel Found Not Guilty.
