TO TAKE OVER THE LINE

Government Railway to New Liskeard is Now Completed.

Toronto, Jan. 9.—At a meeting of the Temiskaming and Northern Ontario Railway Commission on Saturday, it was decided to take over the line from North Bay to New Liskeard. For the present, it is announced that the line will be taken over with the existing staff of the contractors. Superintendent Black, whose appointment was announced some time ago, will have charge of the operation, and will from time to time make recommendations for the regulation of the freight tariff. For the extension to the junction of the G.T.R., the rails are laid for a distance of 23 miles north of New Liskeard. The line has been located for 65 miles, and graded for about 45 miles. There is a ravine at the 25th mile that will cause some delay.

This Jury Disagreed

Montreal, Jan. 9.—The famous St. Alban's School, which has been going on before Justice Curran for the past week, was concluded late Saturday evening. The jury of 10 of them were of the opinion that Rev. Charles J. Bourke, principal of St. Alban's School, Brockville, was not justified in expelling young Dunlop from school. In the matter of damages, however, 10 were for no damages and two for nominal damages.

ON COLONIAL VISIT ON THE EDGE OF WAR

Holman Hunt's Great Picture to Make a Tour of the Colonies.

"THE LIGHT OF THE WORLD"

The Parting of the Ways As Seen By Earl Percy—Sir Robert Finlay, Attorney-General, On the Proposed Conference At Inverness—Country Ought to Have the Facts Faced Before It.

London, Jan. 10.—(C.A.P.)—The Right Hon. Charles Booth, is sending Holman Hunt's great picture, "The Light of the World," to be exhibited in the principal cities of Canada, Australia, New Zealand and South Africa, after which he will offer it as a gift to the nation.

Writing to Mr. Booth, Colonial Secretary Lyttelton, says: "I feel great sympathy with your desire to add to the ties which bind together the various populations of the self-governing states of the Empire by the common admiration for the great and elevating works of national and religious art."

Colony Are Loyal

Earl Percy, speaking at Selby, said we were standing at the parting of the ways, and it might be that the people of the colonies would have to choose between the two fundamental conceptions of Empire. The colonies would remain loyal whatever we did, but the question was whether our connection with the colonies was to be based on sentiment and blood relationship or on mutual community of interest.

Get At The Facts

Sir Robert Finlay, Attorney-General, referring to the proposed conference at Inverness, said that both sides would enter it absolutely free, pledged to nothing. Any recommendation the conference made would be submitted to the electors at the general election. Before any action could be taken the Liberals ought to have the proper facts placed before it. He personally believed that taxation of food was neither desirable or practicable, but they should have the facts.

Lord Durham's View

Speaking at York, Lord Durham said the Liberals' defence of free trade involved no antagonism to the colonies. It was merely a foolish cry of protectionists to discredit the Liberals. It was the Liberals who gave the colonies the most cherished privilege of self-government. Liberals recognized the loyalty, the power and the importance of the colonies. Even if there were a few Liberals who were less dangerous than those protectionists who said the only way to maintain the integrity of the Empire was by an ignominious system of barriers, it was not sound policy to base upon a few different bases, upon the freedom of Government, religion and commerce.

DEATH OF W. C. CALDWELL

Was North Lanark's Late Representative in the Legislature.

Lanark, Jan. 9.—W. C. Caldwell, B.A., ex-M.P.P., for North Lanark, died at his residence, "The Highlands," on Saturday evening in his 62nd year. He was born in Lanark on May 14, 1843. For over 25 years Mr. Caldwell represented North Lanark in the Liberal interest in the Provincial Legislature. At the party convention held here on Dec. 16 the announcement of his withdrawal, owing to ill-health from political life, was received with general regret. His record as a politician is clean and honorable. W. C. Caldwell held the admiration and respect of all classes. He was known far and near; a long public career as well as large business interests bringing him into contact with almost every person in the district. He leaves a widow and family of seven, three sons and four daughters.

COLLAPSE IN "CARMEN"

Twenty Members of a New York Chorus Seriously Hurt.

New York, Jan. 9.—More than twenty members of the chorus of the Metropolitan Grand Opera Company were seriously injured Saturday night by the collapse of the bridge in the street scene in the opening act of "Carmen." The uninjured members of the chorus huddled in a mass at the front of the stage and sang on. The curtain was run down as soon as possible, and Heinrich Conried, manager of the Metropolitan, hurriedly ordered the chorus to be removed to hospitals.

A PRIEST'S CALMNESS

New Rev. Frank DuMoulin of Chicago Aided in Fire.

Chicago, Jan. 9.—Flames appearing among the decorations over the altar of St. Peter's Episcopal church, summoned the officiating priest, Rev. Frank DuMoulin, from prayer at the chancel to service in stilling panic, dismissing a frightened congregation of several hundred persons and fighting the fire that threatened both the lives of the worshippers and their sanctuary. By reason of the priest's calmness and quick grasp of the situation, inspiring confidence and presence of mind in those imperiled without disorder or confusion, and pastor with the aid of the choir, were left free to subdue the flames and save the building, a task they accomplished before the firemen arrived. Rev. Mr. DuMoulin is a Canadian, native of Niagara Falls, Ont., and a son of the Bishop of Niagara.

Toronto, Jan. 6.—Alex. Tate, a paper cutter by trade, was found asphyxiated in his room at 41 Widdowson street yesterday. He was about 40 years of age. He had \$150 cash with him.

BRITAIN TO FIGHT GERMANY

Dr. Passchke Says They Were Much Nearer Warlike Complications Than Many People Dream—A German Liberal Leader Responsible For the Astonishing Statement—Anglo-German Dislike.

Berlin, Jan. 9.—The National Liberal leader, Dr. Passchke, addressing his constituents at Crouznach Saturday made the astonishing statement that Germany and Great Britain were on the verge of war last week, referring evidently to the representations which the German Foreign Office made to Great Britain regarding a bellicose threat against Germany in the Army and Navy Gazette.

Dr. Passchke's words were: "I know of no absolute certainty that Germany and Great Britain last week were much nearer warlike complications than many people dream. Our diplomacy succeeded in averting the danger, though with difficulty."

Why This Anglo-German Dislike?

Vienna, Jan. 9.—(Special via New York.)—In well informed circles here the conviction has gradually come to prevail that the German reason or reasons unknown to the states of Anglo-German relations is causing anxiety to the German Government. As far as is known in Vienna those relations were not so serious as they were at any time since Count Von Buelow measured tongues with Mr. Chamberlain and found that he had still something to learn in the art of political controversy.

At the same time it is presumed that the German Imperial Chancellor would not have disclaimed Anglo-German dislike in his country, as he has recently done in an English review and in the Reichstag, and that he would not have instructed German diplomats in foreign countries to manipulate the Anglo-German misunderstanding, had he not some special object in view. If this object be simply the improvement of Anglo-German relations it is clear from the fact of his dwelling in authoritative quarters here that Count Von Buelow would possess the sympathy of the Austro-Hungarian Government.
