EDITORIAL NOTES.

Telegram: "There are no death-bed visions," says Dr. William Osler. Maybe not, but how does Dr. Osler propose to explain the Borden Club's vision that the honor leader will be Premier of Canada after 1909.

Lord Strathcona arrived in Canada on New Year's day. One feels like wondering how many more mid-winter transatlantic voyages the grand old man will make. The more they are the better Canadians will be pleased.

From an address by Mr. J. H. Tomca, President of the Pittsburgh-Buffalo Company, before the Pennsylvania State Editorial Association some interesting facts regarding coal are gleaned. The world's output in 1880 was 369,413,780 tons; in 1904 it was 973,140,329 tons. Of this the United States produced 20.62 per cent. in 1880 and 36.73 per cent. in 1904, which was the greatest in productivity and the United States' output was greatest in their history, being 352,310,427 tons. Of this United States total Pennsylvania produced 171,108,976 tons, or 49 per cent. Only about 2 per cent. of the coal mined was exported, most of it being sent to Canada.

Chicago British-American: Where now is the greatness of De Witte, the inflated hero of the Portsmouth crowd? We predicted his failure, because of his essential littleness despite his bulk. Almost as puny as the trumpeter Tarr, a compound of fatalism, vanity and criminal imbecility. Japan is truly enjoying her revenge for the indecent humiliation put upon her at Portsmouth. Russia could not humiliate Japan at Port Arthur or on the triumphal march to Vladivostok, because they were then in the open field, alone. But in Portsmouth they were on the carpet of a friend with a keen eye for business, and a strange reluctance to see fair play even while accepting easy flattery as peace-maker. As we said at the time, Japan was wise in allowing Russia to fight Russia to the death. Far better than taxing the Japanese in blood and treasure besides what had already been sacrificed. Russia is in the agonies of self-suicide, and if ever she gets born again to a nobler life it will be by the mercy of nations who justly despise and hate her.

The London Saturday Review, the organ of high Conservatism, is greatly distressed by the last creation of peers, which, it declares, has excited "astonishment and indignation" even "in circles friendly to Mr. Balfour." It protests against "this furious ennoblement of mere financiers," and is particularly exercised over the granting of a peerage to Mr. Chamberlain's friend, Sir Alfred Hamsworth, the publisher of the Daily Mail, who it says, "has done more than any man of his generation to pervert and enfeeble the mind of the multitude; by his numerous journals he has catered to their morbid love of the sensational and their vulgar taste for personal gossip." Regarding the House of Lords as "one of our greatest institutions," the Saturday Review deplores the "adulteration of the peerage" by the conferring of titles "for no other apparent reason than because their recipients possess heavy bags of money." But Mr. Balfour, thus attacked at last even by the faithful Saturday Review, might retort that he has only brought down to date the saying attributed to the second Pitt, that every man with ten thousand a year was entitled to a peerage.
