Canadians On the Vessel. The passenger list is not yet obtainable, but Victorians are looking on the present vessel for W. H. Langley, a well-known local barrister, and his bride, formerly Miss Raiss. Another bridal couple on board are J. Downey of Saanich and wife, the latter a Miss Camp. Messrs, J. Lyle, a former purser of the Rosalie, and Fay, an insurance man, were also on board. The steamer Queen City, which left here last night for the west ocast, had on board a number of Indians, who were to land both at Cloose and Pachena Bay, where the Valencia is. This being the case, the Queen City could not fail to see the stranded vessel, and may have already rendered help.

To Attempt a Rescue. The steamer Queen City will bring the survivors to Victoria in the morning. The lost may be safely put at fifty or sixty, and those in peril at about ninety. Two young men, Daykin and Logan, have gone to the scene in a small boat with ropes in hope of rescuing two men who are on the face of the cliff and unable to get up or back to the ship and in peril from the rising tide.

## FURNACE GAS PROVES FATAL. Three Servants Asphyxiated and One

Is Aiready Dead.

Quebec, Jan. 24.-Three servant-Mrs. Thomas Greene, her husband and an English girl of about 18 years, employed by Mr. and Mrs. Andrew Joseph, were found unconscious on the floor of the basement of the latter's residence, Grand Allee, by other servants, about 8 o'clock yesterday morning. All had been asphyxiated by gas escaping from the furnace. Mrs. Greene is dead.

Her husband attended the furnace and did other chores. They were an English couple, past middle age, and had been here about a year. The key in the furnace was turned, and this, it is thought, caused the gas

### BLIGHTED TREES.

Great Patches of Ontario's Pine Forests Declared to Be Affected. Ottawa, Jan. 24.—Officials of the Dominion geological survey have made

the sensational announcement that a blight has struck the great pine forests of the Temiskaming district. They say that great patches of the grand white pines are losing their follage through some unknown cause. The needle-like leaves of the affected trees were turned in some cases to a yellow

color, and in others to a deep red brownish. In some cases the entire foliage of gigantic forest monsters was so affected, in others the enemy had only attacked in patches, but in all cases appearances pointed to the early death of the trees, which would expose them in a year, or two to the ravages of the "borer," an insect that perforates dead

timber in a manner that makes it absolutely worthless, except for firewood. The discoverers of this condition were Dr. Barlow and W. J. Wilson of the geological survey, both of whom were engaged during last summer in different parts of the Temagami coun-

Dr. Barlow communicated his observations upon his return to Hon. Mr. Cochrane, Provincial Minister of Lands and Mines, who expressed his intention of looking into the matter.

Lake Carriers' Association Did Not Oppose Tunnel Scheme.

Detroit, Jan. 24 .- At the meeting yesterday of the board of United States engineers appointed to hear the application of the Michigan Central Railway to build a tunnel, the opposition of the vessel interests, as represented by President Livingstone, of the Lake Carriers' Association, was entirely withdrawn.
