C. P. R. TO MAKE NEW PORT AT MIDLAND.

Railway will Cut Owen Sound and Build Grain Line from New Port, Victoria Harbor, to Peterboro, This Year—Government to Spend Millions in Improving the Lake Ports.

(Special to The Star.)

Ottawa, Jan. 16.—Plans are now being perfected whereby the Dominion Government will undertake a most comprehensive scheme for the improvement of the leading Canadian ports on the Upper Lakes, so that the larger type of grain carriers, drawing up to twenty feet of water, may be able to develop trade by the Canadian route between Port Arthur and Fort William and the ports of Depot Harbor and Midland, and a new deep water port to be established by the Canadian Pacific at Victoria Harbor, near Midland.

In undertaking what cannot but involve a very large expenditure the Federal Ministers are prompted by the conviction that nothing short of first-class facilities at the chief Canadian ports on Georgian Bay, and Lake Superior will avail to draw the trade that properly belongs to us and that is now being diverted into American channels by way of Buffalo.

TO BE ONE HARBOR.

Port Arthur and Fort William will be made one harbor, and steps will be taken at once to extend the breakwaters at Port Arthur for the protection of the shipping at that port, and to improve the lower stretches of both the Mission river and the Kaministiquia river at Fort William. The Canadian Northern interests have built their terminals at Port Arthur. The Canadian Pacific, on the other hand, has erected its largest elevators at Fort William on the north side of the Kaministiquia. The Grand Trunk Pacific terminals are to be at Fort William also, and in order to give the latter deep water at their docks, considerable dredging will first have to be done. The Kaministiquia has two mouths, one known by that name and the other called the Mission. These join one another at a short distance above Fort William, and it is proposed to excavate both to a depth of twenty-two feet up to junction point, so that vessels can unload, may at the C.P.R. docks, on the Kaministiquia side, be able to go around and come out by the Mission. Both streams are narrow, and it is considered the plan outlined above would afford much greater satisfaction than could possibly be afforded by taking out separate turning basins in either stream.

TO BE EQUAL TO BEST.

From this consideration that has been given the matter it seems better to locate these works in such a way that they will be completed with as little delay as possible. When they are finished the country will possess at Port Arthur and Fort William a national harbor with facilities equal to any on the lakes. But in assuming large obligations to get ready for deep draft boats at Port Arthur and Fort William, the public funds would be almost thrown away unless the Georgian Bay terminals are brought up to a like standard. The Grand Trunk has its terminals at Midland and at Depot Harbor. A certain amount of work will have to be done at both these points, and this the Government are now getting ready to do.

C. P. R.'S NEW LAKE PORT. Victoria Harbor to be Made Prominent—New Elevators to Be Built. (Special to The Globe.) Montreal, Jan. 16.—It is pretty well settled that the C. P. R. will make Victoria Harbor, on the Georgian Bay, an important terminal in connection with the new branch, of which plans were recently filed with the Railway Commission. This branch will connect lake freighters with the main line at or near Peterboro by a short cut across country on easy grades, Victoria Harbor will therefore become, if not the chief point of transshipment of freight from the lake bottoms, at least one of the chief points. Plans for its equipment have not yet been fully decided upon, but it will have proper facilities for the quick handling of large cargoes. This need not mean that Owen Sound will be abandoned in such capacity, for that port and Victoria Harbor are but two of the points where the C.P.R. vessels will discharge grain from vessels that have come down from Fort William. Goderich is another when the second track between Winnipeg and Fort William is ready for operation a large grain elevator can be kept busy on the lakes, and that will naturally call for greater accommodation on this side. But as Victoria Harbor affords the shortest and most economical possibility for connection with the main lines eastward, it is morally certain that the bulk of the shipments for export will pass through the elevators of Goderich will then have an opportunity to look well after the local Ontario demand.

THE C. P. R. COMPANY'S DEFENCE. Grand Trunk Management Will Put up a Strong Opposition. Ottawa Free Press: The 28th inst., has been fixed by the Minister of Railways for the consideration of plans presented by the Canadian Pacific Railway for the proposed line from Peterboro to Victoria Harbor, the new terminal that they intend building on Georgian Bay. The Grand Trunk Railway will have at the same time an opportunity of presenting the reasons why in their judgment the plans in question should not be approved. Mr. Hay's company contends that the C. P. R. location will parallel the existing G. T. R. line through Peterboro and Lindsay and Midland. The C. P. R. admits on its part that the two rights of way will be alongside each other as far east as Orillia, but insists that this cannot be avoided because the only available route from their new port seaward crosses the railway and that this divides Lake Simcoe from Lake Couchiching, in complaining against the parallelism of its line to Midland the Grand Trunk points also to the necessity of rivaling the Canadian Pacific in other parts of Ontario, and insists that its federal authorities are not justified in sanctioning the intended arrangements by which the C. P. R. will parallel the G. T. R. from Toronto to Hamilton, and thence around the Niagara frontier, together with other features of Sir Thomas Simons' programme of construction in the western part of the province.

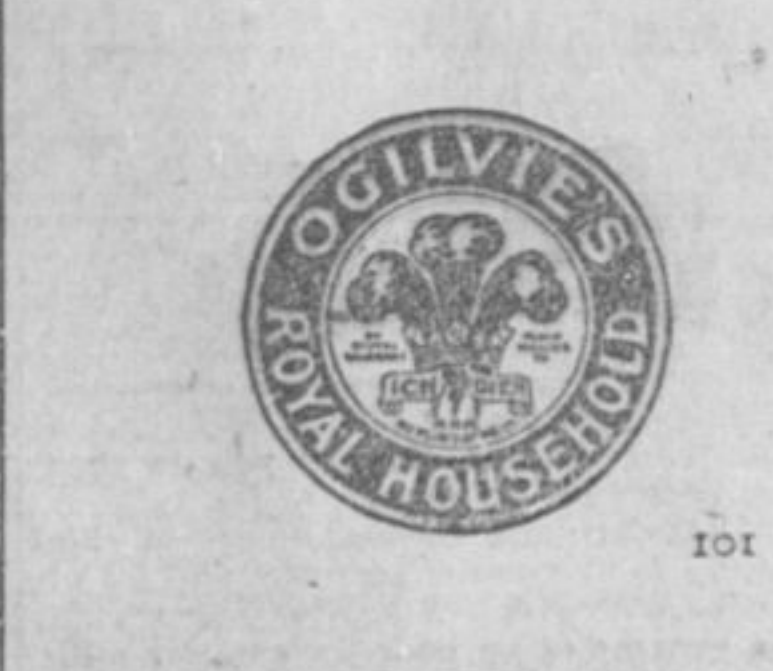
