WINNIPEG'S GREAT CURLING BONSPIEL.

Lindsay Will Send Two Crack Rinks to Compete for the Silverware—Skip Flavell's First Trip to the West Made in 1889—Descriptions of Prizes Offered and Other Particulars.

As two Lindsay rinks will take part in the Bonspiel to be held in Winnipeg, commencing Friday, Feb. 6th, at eight o'clock a.m. some information regarding the Bonspiel will be of interest to our readers. The Bonspiel was commenced in the season of 1889, and in order that the clubs in the East might be interested it was decided to have rinks from the east personally invited, and the late Mr. Sam Harstone was sent East with a rink of Winnipeg curlers. Whether the success of this rink in the Provinces of Ontario and Quebec had anything to do with the lack of response on the part of Eastern curlers or not, is not known, but the only club from the East represented at the Bonspiel was the Lindsay Club by Mr. Flavell's rink. Some idea of the size of the Bonspiel at the present time may be gathered from the fact that one hundred and fifty rinks, coming from Dawson City on the north and west, to Lindsay for certain, and possibly Montreal and Halifax on the south and east, are expected to take part, and the Finance Committee need not expect to get four thousand five hundred dollars to run the Bonspiel without a deficit.

THE OPEN EVENTS.

There are three events open to all rinks:

THE DINGWALL TROPHY.—This Cup is given as a first prize in this competition by D. R. Dingwall; it is valued at \$250, and with it for the first prize goes four Gold Lockets set with diamonds, valued at \$100.

2nd Prize.—Four Silver Hot Water Jugs, valued \$50, given by the Ontario Flour Mills Company.

3rd Prize.—Four Gold Charms, value \$50.

4th Prize.—Four German Steins, value \$25.

EMPIRE TROPHY.—This Cup, value \$250, is given by the McLaren Bros., proprietors of the Empire Hotel. This hotel will be the home of the Lindsay contingent during their stay in Winnipeg. In addition they give as a first prize four Gold Locket Sets, value \$100.

2nd Prize.—Four Gold Lockets, value \$50, given by McDonald and Shea.

3rd Prize.—Four Pair Gold Links, value \$30.

4th Prize.—Four Pair Ebony Military Brushes, value \$25.

TETLEY TEA TANKARD.—This Cup, value \$200, given by Mr. Jos. Tetley & Co., of London, Eng. They give also to the winning rink four Gold Locket Sets, value \$100.

WATER COMMISSIONERS MET.

EX-MAYOR RAY IS SECRETARY-TREASURER AND MANAGER.

A Still Hunt to be Undertaken in Quest of Irregularities.

The regular meeting of the Water Commissioners was held Saturday afternoon in Secretary-Treasurer's Ray's new office in the Dominion Bank block, Pres. Chairman Flavell, Manager-Sec. Treas. D. Ray, J. V. McNeillie, Mayor Vrooman, Thos. Brady, Supt. Hammond.

The minutes of the previous meeting were read and confirmed. A letter was read from ex-Supt. F. K. Dargie, relative to a literary account of some \$15, and on motion the Secretary was instructed to arrive at a settlement and pay the account.

A discussion took place over By-law No. 1, relative to the management of the works, and resolutions of the Board were read and passed. A clause in the By-law, on motion of Messrs. McNeillie and Vrooman, the by-law was passed, signed and sealed.

The Manager and Superintendent filed declarations of office. Moved by Mayor Vrooman and Mr. Brady, that in the absence of the chairman, Mr. McNeillie countersign the resolutions of the Board. The resolutions were passed, and the meeting adjourned.

LICENSING CHEESE FACTORIES.

Lack of Sanitary Needs May Compel the Passing of Such a Measure.

At the convention of the Eastern Dairyman's Association held in Peterboro last week, the following resolution was passed:

"We beg leave to report that although Ontario may not yet be prepared for such a measure as licensing cheese factories and creameries, we believe that a thorough measure of sanitary inspection of cheese and butter factories is in the interests of the dairyman of Ontario, absolutely necessary, and this association would most respectfully petition the government to provide such legislation as may be required to insure our cheese factories, creameries and dairies being kept in a clean and sanitary condition with a pure water supply. The desire is to have the institutions in which any part of our food supply originates made absolutely clean, so that from its surroundings there may be no taint of any kind.


As for the pure water supply, it is essential to the dairy business. It cannot be dispensed with. It would be if conditions permitted it. Just as some people will not hesitate to adulterate their wines and liquors, their sugars and jams, with inferior goods, and sometimes with ingredients that simply add water to the value, so some will add water to the milk. Others will use water which is more pure and healthy.

Nothing but the closest inspection will guarantee freedom from taint, which the people demand, and the government will probably afford it by legislation such as the dairymen have asked for.

The demand comes from a community whose interest is a paramount one. It represents millions of dollars annually, and a growing case among the agriculturists.

AT THE CHURCHES SUNDAY.

THE SABBATH SCHOOL INSTITUTE SPEAKERS IN SEVERAL PULPITS.

Missionary Anniversary Sermon at Cambridge-st. Methodist.

Those in attendance at the Y. M. C. A. song service last night were treated to three thoroughly good musical selections. A solo by Miss Dickinson, of Hamilton, "Face to Face," was beautifully rendered; a cornet and violin duet by Mr. and Mrs. J. Robinson, was greatly enjoyed; the two instruments blending nicely. A vocal duet by Mrs. J. P. Reed and Miss Dickinson was exceptionally well rendered. The whole song service was enjoyed by all present.

A conference of pastors of the town was held this morning, with Mr. Yellowlee, of the Ontario Sunday School Association, respecting making a house visitation of the town, and a scheme was heartily endorsed and a resolution passed in favor of taking a census of the town on the 14th of February. These were present at the conference: Revs. C. H. Marsh, Jas. Wallace, G. R. Welch, Dr. Bishop, L. D. Phelps, and Canon Greene, Orillia, and Messrs. W. McWaters and E. A. Hardy.

AT ST. PAUL'S.

Mr. Lee, a returned missionary from Japan, occupied the pulpit of St. Paul's church last night and gave a very interesting and informing talk on the work in the foreign fields, dealing with the customs and habits of the Japanese race. His remarks were eagerly listened to by a large congregation.

CAMBRIDGE-ST. METHODIST.

Missionary anniversary sermons were preached at Cambridge-st. Methodist church yesterday by Mr. Keenleyside, of London, who gave two interesting sermons, "The Bible and Missions," and the theme of his talk at the morning service. The bible embraced some sixty odd books covering the history of a period of 4000 years, and contained some of the highest forms of literature, its stories being eloquent and thrilling. The bible was the code of laws ever written, and contained nothing but records of great foreign missions.

Whitby Beet Sugar Factory.

Mr. P. C. Graham, former editor of the Part Perry Standard, was in town Saturday in the interests of The Keystone Beet Sugar Company, Limited, the authorized capital of which is \$400,000. A grand location for the factory has been secured for the lake harbor, and the machinery from Warrion factory—which failed for the reason being unsuitable for beet growing—will be removed to Whitby in the spring, so that the factory may be ready to handle the fall supply of beets. The product of 5000 acres will be required to keep the factory running at its fullest capacity, and 2500 acres have already been secured. The tests made some years ago at Guelph College disclosed that the beets grown in Whitby and Lindsay districts contained the highest percentage of sugar of the many samples examined by Mr. Graham is anxious that the people of Victoria Co. shall have a chance to share in the large profits.

and "Go ye into all the world and preach the gospel," and the question is, what are we going to do about it? Out of the day St. Augustine landed on British soil there has sprung up a great day, which has raised the Anglo-Saxon race. Mr. Keenleyside then went into a mass of figures, comparing the enormous sums spent on such articles as liquor, tobacco, chewing gum, sugar, etc., with the comparatively small amount set aside for the work of foreign missions. The speaker's remarks were helpful and interesting.

The choir rendered an excellent anthem under the direction of Mr. Newton. In the evening Mr. Keenleyside's address Mr. Hardy gave a brief talk on the Sunday school work.

AT ST. ANDREW'S.

The pulpits of most of the churches yesterday were filled by delegates of the Sabbath school Institute to be held to-day and to-morrow in connection with our local Sunday Schools. Mr. Thos. Yellowlee, the Extension Secretary, spoke in the Queen-st. Methodist church in the morning and in St. Andrew's in the evening. At the latter church he chose as his text, "Jesus came to seek and to save the lost." Mr. Yellowlee, who speaks with a strong Doric accent, disclaimed any idea of preaching a sermon, but rather wanted to show to his hearers the special work he had in charge in connection with the Ontario Sabbath School Association, viz., that of house-to-house visitation, wherever it was wanted by the local workers. He explained fully how necessary it was, even in this Canada of ours, where everyone is supposed to be within the sound of the gospel, but who were deaf to it and as far off as those living in the heart of Africa. The results of the work where undertaken have simply been astounding. As an example, he mentioned one church situated in the "Ward" in Toronto, which one year has a house-to-house visitation of their own, yet which received over 150 cards of people they did not know in the recent census taken there. Since Mr. Yellowlee took hold of this work he had superintended the census taken in some sixteen places, the last one of which was Toronto. In every one of them good results have followed, and the different ministers have simply been astonished at the number of people living in their midst who expressed a preference for their church, and yet were unknown to the minister or his workers. The speaker gave many graphic illustrations of the good done by a hearty shake of the hand, a kindly word of advice, a timely visit, all of which were our duty as well as our privilege to do. He did not doubt but that the same conditions existed in Lindsay as did in other towns. He knew there were some of the workers who were anxious that this work be taken into it if they did not force it. He had given his message and it was now for them to say whether the work should be done or not. For that purpose there would be a conference to-morrow (Monday).
