SEVENTH ANNUAL MEETING.

Splendid Progress Made During the Past Year-Excellent Report Presented to the Shareholders.

The Seventh Annual Meeting of the Shareholders of the Victoria Loar & Savings Co'y was neld in the Company's office on Monday afternoon, February 3rd, 1903, tot four o'clock.

Present-Messrs. F. C. Taylor, W. Flavelle, W. H. Clarke, R. J. Mc-Laughlin, K.C., H. J. Lytte, J. B. Begg. C. Shittick, W. W. Webster, S. J. Playfair, T. S. Begg, W. Worsley, W. H. Stevens, B.A., J. Mr. W. Flavelle, President, actual as Chairman, and Mr. Low acted as Secretary.

The Secretary read the Directors Report and Financial Statement for the year 1902.

Mr. Flavelle, in moving the ador tion of the Report, said (in part); "It is gratifying to know, that, in cor mon with other monetary institutions of our County, this Company has also shared in the general prosperity. The report of the Directors, now before you for approval, shows the net profit for the year to be \$11,175.32, but of which dividenas amounting to \$6,239.40 had been distributed, and the sum of 283.72 carried to front and loss, and the sum of \$4,600 carried to our rest account, which, added to the amount carried forward from crevious years, gives a total reserve of \$10,000. This I am sure will be satisfactory to our shareholders, ar treciating as it does the value of their stock, and to cur depositors and debenture-bolders it will be none the less pleasing, as it gives added value to their securities.

"Loan Companies must not be confounded with private banks. Loan Companies receive their charters from the Government, report to, and are annually licensed by the Govern ment, and are as much under the control of the Government as are the ordinary chartered banks. While we are now investing \$350,000 of the reople's savings, we should have at least \$500,000, and a profitable and safe investment could be had for a million. To the careful investor our 4 per cent. debentures, interest rayable every six months, issued for periods of from two to five years, is almost an ideal security, requiring no care or anxiety on the part of the investor; simply the presenting of the coupon at the Company's office when due, gives the interest. It is the special business and purpose of this Company to organize the local savings, and accumulations, in their unified form, to invest them in a way it would be in possible to do otherwise, and to secure the largest possible earnings for them, consistent with absolute safety. We have now demonstrated that we can do this successfully, and to the satisfaction of all concerned. "What we need locally is greater confidence in ourselves, in our own

enterrises and institutions. I do not only ask for a generous and hearty support for this growing in stitution, but in this growing time we are not getting our full share of the country's expansion. Industrial enterprises which should be materializing in our midst are still dormant; some of our tresent ones should be enlarged, while new industries should be created. I happ n to know of a local industry that, with an additional capital of from \$15,000 to \$20,000 to enlarge its buildings and to equip them with the necessary machinery, could be made into a very important industry, employing from 40 to 60 additional hands, or ressibly more, with splendid profit to the investor, and corresponding benefit to our town. I mention this to illustrate my point, that what we need is more confidence in ourselves, and greater considence in our enterprises, and a public spirit that will unite symrathy with practical hard cash to enterprises that are worthy of support. The care for our present tax rate will not be found in petty economy, but in increased wealth and population, which means a larger assessment, and this only can come by expansion of our present industries, and the creation of new ones."

. Mr. McLaughlin, in seconding the adoption of the Report, said: "The report cught to be satisfactory to the shareholders. The total net earnings are equal to 8 1-2 per cent. on the Company's capital after navment of all charges and expenses. On the loaning business alone the profits would have paid all expenses and 6 1-2 on capital, but, like manufacturing concerns which increase their profits through by?-profucts the Directors have endeavored to increase the Company's profits by what might be called the bye-products of the business. The Company invests in nothing else and engages in no speculative bus ness, and such stocks, when taken by this Company, are paid for in full and held in the Company's name. I think it well to give the sabrebolders the full facts, so that false rumors may be corrected.

"The growth of the Company during the year ought also to be satisfactory to the shareholders. The growth of assets is in round numbers \$68,000. This is the largest growth in any year and is. I have no doubt, extremely satisfactory to Mr. Low as a result of his first year's management. The Directors have only this to say- that Mr. Low's management during the year has been entirely satisfactory, and that he has surpassed their expecta tions. Of course it is only right to say that the foundation had been well and carefully laid by Mr. Magwood, and we do not attribute the increased growth this year in any way to change of management, but we wish to add that Mr. Low has carried on the policy inaugurated by Mr. Magwood successfully and with the same steady progress.

"It is also very satisfactory to be able to record this growth notwithstanding two things that might have militated against our progress. First, the reduction of our deposit rate of interest, at midsummer, from 4 per cent. to 3 1-2 per cent. We do not think that any derosits have been taken away from the Company by reason of this being done, to be placed elsewhere, but we find it has had some effect in causing our depositors to be more anxious to get their money out upon mortgages, and in that way we think that if the deposit rate had been kert at 4 per cent, the Company might have shown a still greater growth. This fear we must remove, as the Commany have adopted a policy, and will continue to do so, of raying any debentures at any time the debenture holder might require the money, with deposit rate of interest from the last interest day. The Company in doing so are following their general rolicy of endeavoring to meet the conveniences and wishes of all their customers in so far as they possibly can.

"Another thing that has occurred this year that might have a detrimental effect upon our depositors was the failure of the two private Banks at Oakville. And the Government, in passing the Loans Corperation Act took similar procautions to proteet the rublic, and their desire was in issuing charters to Loan Companies, to create saving institution swhich would be absolutely safe, and some sixty years of experience shows that the object of the Gov- Light, Heat & Power Co., light-

ernment has been attained. I was talking to the Manager of the first loan company incorporated in Ontario, now nearly sixty years ago, and he was giving me some items of the history of Companies in this Province. He ended by saying that Companies in Ontario have been uniformly successful with the exception of a few who lent on inferior properties in Toronto during the boom, and of them only one failed. ### AT OSGOODE HALL

Court of Appeal Will Have to Decide the Legality of Christian Science-Roy Lewis' Death.

Toronto, Feb. 4 .- At Osgoode Hall yesterday James Henry Lewis appealed against his conviction on a charge of manslaughter arising out of the death of his child, Roy Lewis, in August, 1901, who was given Christian Science treatment for his ailment in the place of medical attendance. The indictment charged that Lewis had unlawfully and without lawful excuse neglected to provide his child with "necessaries," which he was legally bound to do by virtue of a provision in the Criminal Code. At the trial Chief Justice Falconbridge reserved three questions for the opinion of the Court of Appeal, after having decided that medicines came under the head of "I cessaries." These questions are:

1. Was there sufficient evidence to warrant the conviction? 2. Was the direction to the jury that the word necessaries as used in the Criminal Code included medicine and medical treatment correct; and 3. Was the direction that the evidence as to Christian Science cures had no bearing on the case except as showing good faith in the prisoner, a proper direction?

The questions will be considered. EACH GOT ONE YEAR.

Sentence Passed Upon St. Thomas Personators-Investigation at Pembroke.

St. Thomas, Feb. 4.-Judge Bell of Chatham yesterday pronounced sentence in the three cases of personation, and ballot stuffing committed here or Dec. 4th, in the referendum

Robt. Foster, for impersonation, was sentenced to one year's imprisonment in jail, without hard labor, and a fine of \$400.

Henry Branton and William Walsh were each sentenced to a year's imprisonment for attempted ballot-stuf-

None of the men are in the city. Six Months at Pembroke.

Ottawa, Feb. 4.-The investigation into the alleged personation in behalf of the liquor interests at the referendum on the Liquor Act, December 4th, was commenced yesterday afternoon before Judge Deacon. of Pembroke. As far as can be learned two charges have been laid, one of which is against a veterinary surgeon, who pleads that he thought Our County fathers assembled for he had a vote in every ward in which he owned property.

O. Lefebvre, Nelson street, was convicted and sentenced to six months in iail and fined \$100. J. B. Hollingsworth, veterinary surgeon, pleaded guilty to voting twice on his own name. The judge reserved sentence until a decision is handed out by the High Court on a similar case in Western Ontario.

Local Option Carries Day.

White River Junction, Vt., Feb. 4. -- The advocates of local option carried the State yesterday, and after half a century of prohibition the cities and towns of Vermont will after March 1 be permitted to decide whether or not intoxicating liquors shall be sold in these communities.

Canadians in Paris.

Ottawa, Feb. 4. - The Canadian agent in Paris writes the Department of Trade and Commerce that a meeting was held recently in Paris to form a Canadian Chamber of Commerce. Over twenty-five Canadiana
