JEWISH SCHOOL RIGHTS.

Sustice Davidson Rules That Paul Pinsler's Son Cannot Have Scholarship Because Father Is Not a Protestant.

Montreal, Feb. 16.-It appears that certain disabilities still remain to the Hebrews, as regards the school laws of this province. Mr. Justice Davidson has just dismissed the petition of Paul Pinsler, who, as tutor to his son, Jacob, applied for a mandre s to compel the Protest-ant School Commissioners to grant to his son a commissioner's scholarship at the High School. The boy attended Dufferin Schoal for the prescribed term, and came out first in the examinations. The court ruled, however, that as the father was not a Protestant, and not a school taxpayer on property owned by him. the boy was not entitled to the privilege. In delivering the judgment, His Lordship reviewed the different aspects of the case, and the whole school legislation of tae pro-

The petitioner is a British subject, and has been for years a tenant resident of Montreal. He is not an owner of real estate. Is son, Jacob, became a pupil of the Dufferin School in September, 1895, and so continued through the intervening scholastic years to June, 1901, when in the class examinations of the sixth and final grade he won first prize. This standing would have entitled him to a commissioner's scholarship, which carries with it free tuition throughout the High School course. Had his father been a Protestant, even if a tenant, he would have been granted the scholarship without question The grant from the public funds, in aid of the Public Schools in this city, is divided between the boards, according to the relative proportions of the Roman Catholi and Protestant populations in said city, according to the then last

There are now over 10,000 Jews in this city, and besides, no doubt many property-owning taxpayers who are neither Protestants nor Roman Catholics. The petition was dismissed with costs.

C. P. R. STEAMSHIP LINE.

Not a Single Ship Has Yet Been Purchased by Company.

London, Feb. 16.-Commenting or the rumor, which was revived Saturday, that the Canadian Pacific Rail-Way Company had purchased all the Canadian steamships of the Elder-Dempster Line, The St. James' Gazette yesterday says: "We are in a position to state

that the report is unfounded." The report goes on to say that there has never been any question of purchasing the ships of the Elder-Dempster Line. Some time ago the Canadian Pacific Railway Company sanctioned the establishment of a line of freight steamships between Canada and Europe with the object of carrying its own traffic, instead of, as hitherto, turning it over to other steamship lines. The Canadian Pacific Company's steamship superintendent of piers, who is now in London, is working with Mr. Baker, the company's European representative. They are engaged in negotiations for the purchase of sixteen vessels of 10,000 tons dead weight

The St. James' Gazette says it is authorized to state that not a single ship has yet been purchased. Negotiations are proceeding with a number of companies, including the Elder-Dempster Line, but no decision on the subject is expected for a week There is no intention of buying up the Elder-Dempster Line, and the negotfations only involve one or two of their steamships.

Westport, Conn., Feb. 16 .- Capt Samuel Greenwood, whose home was in Rochester, N. Y., lost his life in his cabin on the steam canalboat J. L. Hyde, yesterday while asleep. The boat was tied to the wharf of Hubbell & Bradley Co. An overheated stove caused a fire which partly destroyed the boat. The firemen who were summoned to fight the flames found the body of the captain. A though it was partly burned, it believed that death was due to su focation. Capt. Greenwood leaves a widow and two children in Rochester, N. Y.

THE CLAIMS OF THE COMPANY

Terms of the Canadian Pacific Railway Contract, Say Judges-Two Questions Remained to Be Argued-Subsidy Was Earned Before Land Was Available.

Winnipeg, Feb. 16 .- At the opening of full court Saturday to resume argument on the C.P.R. land tax question Chief Justice Killam indicated that all the Judges were of opinion that the Province of Manitoba was bound by the terms of the C.P.R. contract, so far as the territory which was theirs, that is at the time of the contract, within the bounds of the Northwest Territories, and which was afterwards added to

the Province of Manitoba. This intimation rendered any argument unnecessary, both in the North Cypress and the Argyle cases, as to whether the exemption provided for in the C.P.R. contract had ceased to exist at the transfer of the territory to Manitoba. It left for argument two questions merely: From what date the exemption from taxation runs, (a) whether from the date of the contract, or (b) from the time the lands were earned, or (c) from the date of the respective patents from the Crown.

Mr. Ewart, K.C., addressed the court, devoting the whole morning read from the statement of the case show that at the time of the making of the contract the territory lying west of the 102nd degree longitude (about 200 miles west of Winnipeg) was almost completely uninhabited, and only by its general characteristics was its value known to the people of Canada or to the company. It had not at that time been surveyed or in any way mapped out into townships, municipal or other boundaries, except that some portions of it had been divided into blocks of sixteen townships each Afterwards, from year to year, the Government caused portions of the belt to be surveyed and set off into townships and sections, but a good deal of it was not surveyed until 1891. It was therefore, quite impossible that title should pass to the C.P.R. at the time of the contract, or at the time when the lands in the belt was earned, which was as early as 1882.

Mr. Tupper, K.C., followed upon the same line, He urged that by the contract the railway was free from taxation by a municipal corporation The court adjourned until Wednesday next.

POLICEMAN KILLED ON DUTY.

Murderer Had Already Shot a Weman

Lebanon, Pa., Feb. 16 .- Mrs. Ira Barker, aged 22, was shot dead on the street Saturday night, in full view of scores of persons, and in resisting arrest the murderer killed a policeman before he was landed in jail. She was standing on a street corner with her hasband and several friends, when a man who, at the time, was recognized, stepped up to her and shot her in the head. assassin escaped. The husband suspected David Shand, aged 25 years, who was convicted, but was out on bail, pending application for a new trial for robbing Mrs. Barker's stepfather of \$350. She was the principal witness against him. The police at once instituted a search, and at midnight Shand was located. He resisted arrest, and during a desperate struggle with the policemen he killed Cyrus Schaffer, one of their number. He was finalty landed in jail without further trouble.

A TRAGIC DEATH.

Lorne Millward Killed by a Torente Trolley on Saturday.

Toronto, Feb. 16. - Another life was crushed out beneath the wheels of the relentless trolley on Saturday afternoon. The victim was Lorne Millward, the three-year-old son Benjamin Millward of 3 Robinson terrace. The little fellow, with companion, started to cross Queen street, just west of Bathurst street. They passed safely by a westbound car, only to find themselves in front of eastbound Queen car No. 688. Lorne became confused, and paused, and the next instant was on the fender. He rolled off, and under, and in a moment, his little life was gone. The body was wedged in beneath the forward truck of the car, and timbers had to be procured to raise the car sufficiently to allow the body to be taken out. An inquest will be

THE C.P.R. LAND TAX | VENEZUELA IS FREE | ARREST OF LEADERS

Blockade Was Officially Raised on Saturday Afternoon.

POPULACE WILD WITH JOY.

British Cruiser Left La Guayra Harbor For Trinidad After One of Her Officers Had Announced the Fact on Shore-The Government Then Began Active Measures to Crash Out the Revolution.

La Guayra, Feb. 16 .- The blockade has been officially raised. The commander of the British cruiser Tribune, the only warship here, sent an officer ashore yesterday morning with the announcement that the Tribune would leave yesterday afternoon for Trimidad. The populace is wild with

Rebels Get No Respite.

Caracas, Feb. 16 .- Since early Saturday morning Venezuelans have been awaiting impatiently the official intimation that the blockade had been raised. Yesterday morning. however, the British man-of-war Tribune was still at La Guayra enforcing the blockade and preventing fishermen from leaving the harbor. The Government was puzzled until, at 11 o'clock, the news reached Caracas that the captain of the Tribune had notified the authorities at La Guayra that the blockade was raised. At 3 o'clock yesterday the Tribune left for Trinidad. The news received from all Venezuelan ports, except Goro and Higuerote, is that the foreign warships sailed away yester-The Government immediately on receiving the news that the blockade had been raised, sent troops in all directions to crush the revolution without giving the rebels a mo-

Glad It Is All Over.

ment's respite.

Willemstad, Curacao, Feb. 16 .-There is great rejoicing among all classes here at the end of the Venezuelan blockade. Many sailing vesseis are lying in this port with cargoes for Venezuelan ports; they will leave to-day. A number of steamers are loading for the same destination A great amount of coffee is awaiting transportation from Venezuela to the United States. No one is apparently more glad at the raising of the blockade than those on board the blockading squadrons.

Andrew Carnegie's Offer. Washington, Feb. 16 .- It was learned last night that had Venezuela been unable to meet the demand of Germany for the payment of \$360,000 Andrew Carnegie stood ready to supply this sum in cash to relieve Venezuela of any embarrassment maintain peace. A direct offer of a loan of \$360,000 to Venezuela, to be paid over to Minister Bowen, was made by Mr. Carnegie, but was not accepted, because Venezuela was able to meet the demand of Germany in a satisfactory manner.

THE STRICKEN CATTLE. Foot and Mouth Disease Still Prevalent in Vermont.

Washington, Feb. 16. - Another outbreak of the foot and mouth disease near Chester, Vt., was reported yesterday. A berd in that locality was found infected some time ago but it was thought the disease had been entirely stamped out. Dr. D. Salmon, the chief of the Bureau of Animal Industry, who will go to Boston Monday to investigate the recurrence of the outbreak, said yesterday that he did not think there was danger of great increase in the number of cases, but the situation as rather uncertain.

Jury Falled to Agree.

Indianapolis, Ind., Feb. 16 .- After being out forty-eight hours, the jury in the case of Dr. J. C. Alexander failed to reach an agreement, and was discharged at 10 o'clock yesterday morning. On the final ballots the vote stood eight for acquittal and four for conviction. The attorneys for the State have not decided what they will do.

The Morgan Forgeries. London, Feb. 16 .- A warrant has been issued for the arrest of Count Maurice de Bosuard, in connection with the forgeries of J. Pierpont Morgan's signature on a number of bills, purporting to have been given in payment for purchases of pictures and bric-a-brac.

Engineer Was Burned. St. Thomas, Feb. 16.-Engineer Waltz of the M.C.R. was severely injured at Attercliffe Saturday night The door of the fire box was burst open by an explosion of gas, and the escaping flames badly burnt Mr Waltz's hands and face.

Killed by Chinese Pirates.

Victoria, B. C., Feb. 16 .- The steamer Tosca Maru has reached port from Yokohama. She brought hews that pirates on the steamer Oanfa, a small vessel on the West River, had killed a European officer and five Chinese.

Firemen's Union. Toronto, Feb. 16. - The firemen

who had become members of a labor union have bowed to the wishes of Chief Thompson, backed up by the majority of the City Council, and have agreed to disband their organization.

British Expedition Thoroughly Successful in Northern Nigeria.

London, Feb. 16 .- A telegram has been received from Brig.-Gen. Sir F. D. Lugard, the High Commissioner of Northern Nigeria, announcing that the Tritish expedition against the native releas had been successful. Kano was occupied on February 8, and the natives who opposed the Bitish hed 300 men killed. The Emir, with 1,000 horsemen, fled northward towards Sokoto. The British had two officers wounded.

Bulgaria Breaking Up the Macedonian Committee.

Austria Mobilising Troops on the Balkan Border-Austro-Bussian Demands Mederated-Big Protest Meeting in Paris-Albanians Against Reforms-Turkey Relieved by Bulgaria's Attitude,

Sofia, Bulgaria, Feb. 16. - President Michaelovsk of the Central Macedonian Committee; Gen. Zontcheff, the vice-president; President Stanischeff of the Sarafoff Macedonian Committee and many others have been arrested.

It is officially announced that the Government has decided to dissolve the Macedonian Committee in Bulgaria and place a strong military cordon along the Macedonian frontier, thus demonstrating Bulgaria's readiness to fulfil her international obligations.

Dr. Danew, the Premier, announced in the National Assembly yesterday the measures which led to the arrest of the chief officers of the Maeedonian Committee, and added that the offices of the Central Macedonain Committee had been selzed and all the papers there confiscated. He said the dissolution of the Macedonian Committee in the provinces had been accomplished without opposition. Macedorians have been summoned

to a mass meeting to-day to protest against the action of the Government and to demand the release of the prisoners.

10,000 Protest.

Sofia, Bulgaria, Feb. 16.-A mass meeting of 10,000 Macedonians was held here yesterday to protest against the action of the ment in dissolving the Macedonian committees in Bulgaria. The meeting demanded the re-establishment of the Macedonian Societies and the judicial punishment of individual offenders.

It is reported that warrants are out for the arrest of Boris Sarafoff, Yankoff, and other Macedonian leaders. Sarafoff is said to be now in Mace-

donia organizing a revolt. Unless Turkey now withdraws her troops from the Bulgarian frontier the Government will suspect her intention and issue an order for the mobilization of Bulgarian forces.

Porte Greatly Relieved.

Constantinople, Feb. 16 .- In official circles it is asserted that Porte has received from the powers assurance regarding Bulgaria's pacific intentions and that it has been greatly relieved thereby. At the same time the military council has completed the plans for the mobilization of the second and third army corps, and has decided that in event of it becoming necessary take the field in Macedonia Marshal Edhem Pasha, the Generalissimo in the Graeco-Turkish war, will hav supreme command of the quarter of million of men which would be available there.

Turkey Masses 100,000 Men.

London, Feb. 16 .- Developments in the Balkan crisis promise to be more rapid than anticipated ten days ago. There is now ample authority, despite official denials, for saying that Turkey has already massed 100,000 troops on the Bulgarian frontier. To End Turkish Misrule.

Paris, Feb. 16 .- A meeting of four thousand persons, presided over by Baron Constant d'Estournelles supported by many prominent men. was held yesterday in connection with the Macedonian situation. A resolution was adopted calling on the Government to work energetically to promote the enforcement of the Berlin treaty and to put an end to Turkish misrule in Macedonia.

Reform Demands Pruned. Vienna, Feb. 16.-The rumor to the effect that owing to the difficulty of obtaining the consent of the other powers or for other reasons, the Austro-Russian demands of forms in Macedonian have been greatly attenuated since Count Lamsdorff drafted them, was practically confirmed last night by the official Fremdenblatt, which states that the demands are carefully framed so as not to overstep the limits prescribed by respect for the Sultan's suzerain rights, and that being confined to comparatively modest bounds, they are more likely to attain the desired end than if they were more pretentious. They not, however, says the official gan, succeed if Macedonia is made It is regarded here as certain that these half reforms will not satisfy
