BRITISH COLUMBIA FRUIT.

Shipments from Our Pacific Province Rule Northwest Merket.

Some interesting facts regarding the fruit industry in the Prairie Pro- ity is explained by its unapproachable vince were brought out at the recent | Merit. meeting of the British Columbia Fruit Growers' Association. The growing commercial importance of the industry is evidenced by the increased shipments by freight and express, as the following figures will show: There were carried by the C. P. R. during 1902, 1469 tons of fruit, Dominion Express Co. carried in 1897, 70 tons of fruit; in 1901, 378 tons; in 1902, 483 tons; in 1903, ov or 676 tons. The establishment of a fruit cannery in New Westminister is assured, which will employ forty to fifty hands during the season. This will give growers a market for their surplus fruit.

Markets. - At the present time British Columbia fruit practically rules the markets as far east as Cal-The markets of the Northwest, though vast in value, are very scattered; Winnipeg is the great wholesale centre, and is of such importance that it enters into the calculations of fruit growers all over the continent, consequently the competition there is keen. Orders are being received from Australia, Hawaii, China and Japan, and efforts were made last fall to get a foothold in Britain. HOUSE OF AMUSEMENT.

Boarding House is Not Necessarily a Place of Entertainment.

A boarding house is not naturally house of entertainment, so the Divisional Court at O.gooda Hall, consisting of Chancelior Boyd, Mr. Justice Ferguson and Mr. Justice Meredith, have determined. This may come as a shock to some keepers of popular resorts, but it apparently is the law. The redeeming point about the decision may be that as a board. ing-house is not a house of entertainment, intoxicating beverages may be drunk on the premises. A Mr. Cretcilli kept a boarding or lodging-house in the town of Ningara Falls. This was a private boardinghouse, although from twenty to forty men boarded with Mr. Cretelli and occasionally strangers dropped in and had a friendly drick with the guests. The Crown contended that this constituted Mr. Fretelii's hospitable boarding-house a house of entertainment within the meaning of the Act, which forbade liquor to be consamed on the promises. Mr. Cretchi had been fined by the police mugistrate at Niagara Falls for permitting liquor to be drunk in his boarding-house, but the Divisional Court has settled the law by quashing the conviction deeming that the occasional drinking by strangers in the house did not constitute it a house of public entertairmout, and ordered Mr. Cretelli's fine te be restored.


